4. BUSINESS ITEMS

a) PLANNING PROCESS FOR UPDATING NATURAL RESOURCES MANAGEMENT PLAN

Staff introduced the history and background of Roseville's Natural Resources Management Plan including the following information:

Natural Resources Prioritization in Guiding Documents

- Parks and Recreation System Master Plan
 - Vision
 - *Environmental Stewardship.* We envision our parks as an opportunity to care for our wild places and creatures, where we have been entrusted to manage a

resource so future generations benefit from the spirit of nature, and where nature is extended to the experience of every park visitor.

- Goals & Policies
 - ***Natural resources management.*** Preserve significant natural resources, lakes, ponds, wetlands, open spaces, wooded areas, wildlife habitats, and trees as integral aspects of the parks system.
- Outcomes
 - Preserve natural assets and significant environmental features...
 - Foster environmental awareness and promote and manage the presence of wildlife and wild places.
- Long-term View
 - ***Environmental Stewardship.*** We envision parks as opportunities to care for our wild places and creatures, where we have been entrusted with a resource that must be managed and cared for so that future generations will benefit from the spirit of nature, its function, and its regenerative qualities, and where nature is extended to the experience of every park visitor.

Natural Resources – Brief History

- 2002 Natural Resources Plan Adopted
 - Prioritized Natural Resources as a key portion of Roseville’s Parks
 - Restore and manage natural areas (e.g., forest, prairie, wetland)
 - Native plantings in developed parks
 - 2010 P&R System Master Plan Adopted
- 2014 Natural Resources Renewal Program
 - Identified potential projects
 - Assigned priority rankings
 - Identified potential outside funding sources
 - Ensured an aggressive, intentional, and systematic implementation phase
 - Developed a program that empowered and mobilized volunteers

The Commission reviewed before and after pictures of natural resource projects located at:

- Reservoir Woods (Prairie/Savanna)
- Willow Pond Park (Shoreline Restoration)
- Bennett Lake (Shoreline Restoration)

Natural Resources Renewal by the Numbers

- All parks touched by the program, each of the original projects have been completed.
- More than \$600,000 in grant funding acquired.
- More than 6,000 volunteer hours worked in the program and hundreds of volunteers engaged.
- CIP category developed for future Natural Resources planning and work.

The commission reviewed the monthly Natural Resource events that were held in 2023 as well as the total Natural Resource volunteer hours in 2023 (2,430 volunteer hours).

Next Phase Goals

- Project list for immediate work.
- Tangible goals for NRM over a 5-10-year timeframe, with benchmarks.
- Engage stakeholders in the development of the plan.
- Prioritized list of potential NRM activities.
- Cost estimates for park project/activity implementation & long-term maintenance.
- Identify opportunities for additional grant funding.

Budget and Consultant Selection

- Stantec Environmental Consulting
 - Award winning and highly regarded.
 - City has a 22 year partnership with Lead Ecologist, Paul Bockenstedt.
 - Uniquely understands the existing conditions and history of the work that has been done.
 - Co-created this proposal with the City and is very flexible to adaptation based upon feedback from stakeholders.
- Work to begin on Martin Luther King Day.

Vice-Chair Matts-Benson asked how volunteers are recruited. Staff responded that volunteers were recruited through various including posters, direct mail and advertisements in the brochure.

Vice-Chair Matts-Benson relayed that she really liked the StoryMap idea that was proposed by Stantec in their “Proposal for Parks Natural Resources Management Master Plan”.

**b) REACH FOR RESOURCES AND PARKS AND RECREATION FEE ASSISTANCE
YEAR IN REVIEW**

- Reach for Resources - 2023 Program Usage
 - Reach for Resources Overview
 - Provide trained staff to assist
 - Provide feedback to our staff & evaluation
 - Provides training to our staff
 - 2023 by the numbers
 - 204 hours of inclusion services used.
 - 13 different children utilized the service.
 - More than 15 different programs.
- Lessons Learned and Moving Forward
 - Better program experience for all participants
 - Participants with both physical and cognitive impairments took advantage of the program
 - Administratively labor intensive
 - Likely more use in the future
 - Difficult to meter usage
 - 2024 Agreement with Reach
 - More hours (268)
 - \$12,100 or more (originally budgeted \$7,000 for 2024)

Vice-Chair Matts-Benson asked staff if the Reach for Resources service is only for Roseville residents. Staff responded that, currently, the service is not limited to just Roseville residents.

Commissioner Boulton commended staff on implementing this program. He also suggested potentially reaching out to the school district to understand if there was an opportunity to utilize shared resources to offer these types of services.

Commissioner Ybarra asked if there are any grant opportunities that would apply to the Reach for Resources program. Staff relayed that they are not aware of any current grant opportunities at this time.

- 2023 Fee Assistance
 - Available to Roseville residents with a financial need
 - Pays for 80% of the program cost up to \$150
 - Free reduced school lunch eligible

- Increased promotion and began to track demographic data of participants
- 2023 Increased per-person maximum from \$100 to \$150
- \$10,000 in 2024 annual budget for fee assistance

The Commission reviewed the fee assistance financials from 2018-2023 and the demographic makeup of those utilizing the Fee Assistance Program vs. residents of Roseville. The demographic makeup of those utilizing the Fee Assistance Program is currently more diverse than the residents of Roseville.

Commissioner Arneson asked how the increase from \$100 to \$150 was advertised. Staff relayed that the information was included the Parks and Recreation brochure and on social media.

Commissioner Beckmann asked if donations were still being accepted for the Fee Assistance Program. Staff confirmed donations are still being accepted. The Commission discussed potential options to expand the collection of donations for this program.

Commissioner Ybarra questioned if feedback had been received that the \$150 amount is not enough to allow everyone to participate in programs. Staff stated that they had not heard that specific feedback. However, based on the necessary cost of some programs the \$150 would not cover the participation fee.

The Commission acknowledged how great the Fee Assistance Program is and that they are pleased that Roseville Parks and Recreation offers it.

5. OTHER BUSINESS

a) DEPARTMENTAL UPDATES

- The Guidant John Rose MN OVAL has won *USA Today 10Best* for the category of “Best Ice Skating Rink.”
- The New Year’s Eve on Ice event was held on December 31, 2023 (2-9 p.m.) at the Roseville Skating Center and Guidant John Rose MN OVAL with approximately 2,500 attendees.
- Neighborhood ice rinks have not opened yet due to the unseasonably warm weather. Staff will continue to work to open them as soon as weather conditions allow.
- The ski trail at Cedarholm Golf Course will begin to be groomed when there is snow cover on the ground. Also, ski and snowshoes will be rented out at that time.
- Candlelight Snowshoe event at Cedarholm Golf Course and Community Building on January 26 (weather permitting) from 6-8p.m.
- The outdoor broomball league is currently on-hold due to weather.
- The first neighborhood meeting was held with Rosebrook Park residents on December 13. Feedback was received from residents on topics such as trail lighting, connections and the wading pool.

OPERATING POLICY # 40

DATE: October, 1988

POLICY TITLE: Assigning Names to City Facilities

PURPOSE: From time to time there is a need to name City of Roseville parks and recreation facilities. The adopted policy contains an orderly process for accomplishing this need.

DESCRIPTION:

The following policy adopted by the City Council on October 5, 1988, shall be used for assigning names to city Parks and Recreation facilities:

It shall be the policy of the City of Roseville to refer to the Parks and Recreation Commission, any activity involving the naming or changing of names of any city-owned parks or recreational facilities.

The Commission shall recommend to the City Council for approval, names for new sites, facilities or portions of facilities. This includes any changes in names to existing facilities.

The naming of parks and recreational facilities will be given consideration by the Parks and Recreation Commission based on the following factors:

- natural habitat, i.e., vegetation, terrain, animals, etc.
- geographic location, i.e., street names, directions, etc.
- appropriate non-descript terminology, i.e., acronyms or joining of two words or names or activities, etc.

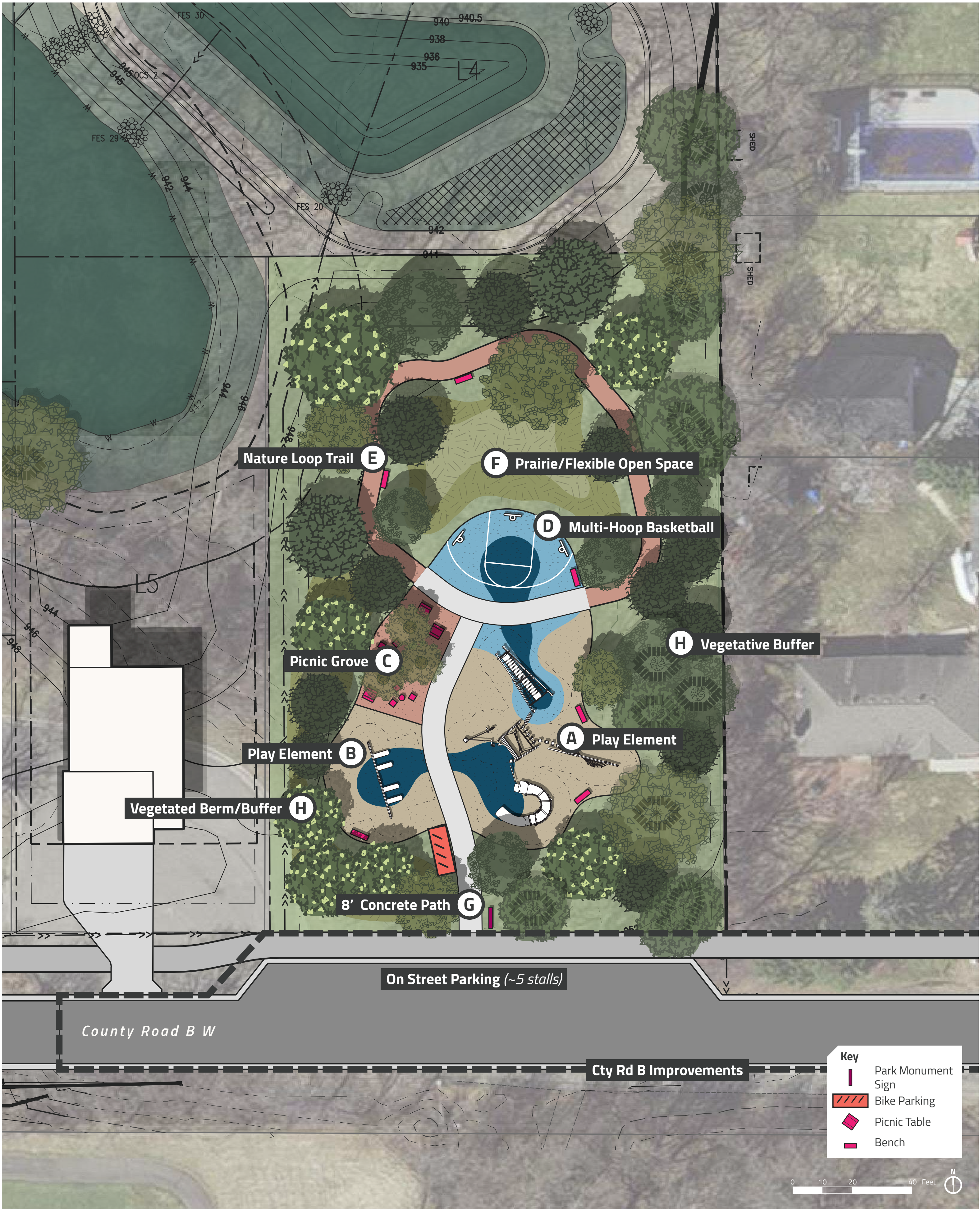
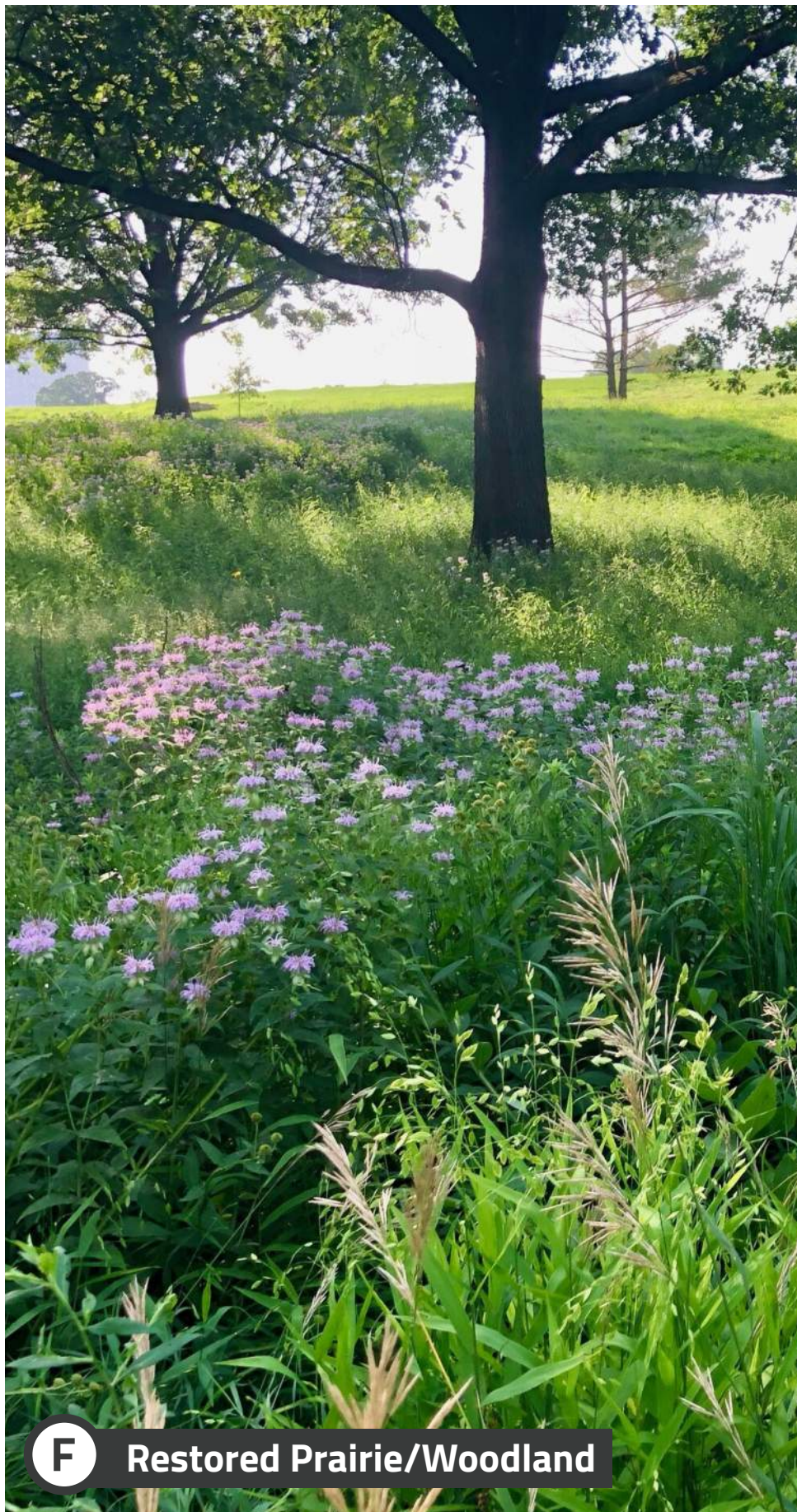
Only under certain and exceptional circumstances will consideration be given to the names of individuals (alive or deceased) and/or organized groups, associations or businesses. To be considered the individual, group, association or business must have made a significant and exceptional contribution to the site involved or to the community as a whole. Such contributions, (immediate or deferred) should be for recreation purposes and may include:

- substantial financial donations
- substantial property donations

In addition, recognition plaques, memorial plaques or dedications may be placed throughout the Park and Recreation system by the Parks and Recreation director and with the recommendation of the Parks and Recreation Commission.

ITEM DESCRIPTION: Discuss Possible Solutions to Mitigate the Possible Loss of Veterans Park

Background

From 2020 through 2022, the City conducted a Master Plan Study to identify solutions for addressing the current and future spatial needs for City support facilities including City maintenance (both parks and public works), public safety, and the license center. The study identified additional needs and possible locations for new and expanded facilities.

The final approved plan calls for a new maintenance facility (which would support both parks and public works) to be constructed where Veterans Park is currently located. More information on the process and approved plan can be found at www.cityofroseville.com/3472/Civic-Campus-Master-Plan. The City is currently pursuing funding to begin the detailed design and ultimately construction of the facility.

Staff will provide an overview of how Veterans Park is currently used and share some preliminary approaches that could be considered to mitigate some of the impact related to the loss of the park.

Staff will request feedback from the Commission on some of the proposed strategies and solicit any other ideas that the Commission might have. It is anticipated that this will be the first of several conversations related to this topic.

Recommendation

Receive presentation on the uses of Veterans Park, and some preliminary strategies under consideration for replacement. Provide feedback to staff including preferred strategies, or other ideas on how to mitigate the potential loss of the space.

ITEM DESCRIPTION: SWOT Analysis of Parks and Recreation System

Background

One of the most important roles of the Parks and Recreation Commission is to provide feedback to staff regarding the services provided, and direction for possible changes to the services in the future. One productive way to structure broad, organization-wide feedback is with a SWOT (Strength, Weakness, Opportunity, and Threat) analysis. A SWOT analysis helps an organization identify what it does well and areas for improvement at a broader level.

The attached template could be used to structure the conversation around the Parks and Recreation Department's Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats. In preparation for this conversation, it is recommended that commissioners bring with them a list of the following to the meeting:

- Current Strengths of the Parks and Recreation Department
- Current Weaknesses of the Parks and Recreation Department
- Opportunities for the Parks and Recreation Department
- Threats to the Parks and Recreation Department

These observations (both broad and/or specific) can be a useful tool when determining long-term planning needs and inform mid to short-term decision-making such as resource allocation.

Recommendation

Discuss the Strengths, Weaknesses, Opportunities, and Threats currently facing the Roseville Parks and Recreation Department.

i take my 8 yo grandson to many playgrounds in Roseville and other cities - we went to 4 different ones yesterday (1/28/24), even though it was barely above freezing outside. i have some suggestions for future Roseville play structures:

1) try not to face any surfaces directly south. in the summer the sun hitting slides and large swings makes them way too hot for children to use. eg the largest slide at Tamarack Park.

2) i'm not sure why manufacturers don't place drain holes at the end of slides, where water collects, but the parks and rec department should drill drain holes so slides can be used soon after a rainfall.

3) we need more ziplines of the style that the rider sits on a round seat - we have plenty of the style that they hold onto a metal handle.

4) somewhere place one or two TODDLER height basketball hoops. little kids like to shoot baskets, too! they don't need a hard surface, just something to shoot at. a backboard could be placed on just about any metal pole in a park.

5) shade over a play structure is very important in the hot summer months. the large, newer playground at central park is nice, but there is no shade, making the whole structure very hot at times.

Adult Day Trips: Mobility Notes

Level 1: Easy

Expectations: This tour requires light physical activity. Tour members should expect intermittent walking, with occasional slight inclines and stair climbs, including boarding the motor coach, boat/ferry, tram, etc. There will be some walking to general points of interest. Guests should be able to climb a set of stairs, walk up or down slight slopes, and navigate some uneven terrain. Appropriate for all participants including those with lower mobility and who are comfortable participating in at least three hours of activity per day.

Level 2: Moderate

Expectations: This tour requires moderate physical activity. Participants should expect a moderate amount of walking. There will be time to rest between activities. To enjoy this tour, you should be prepared to walk slightly longer distances, climb stairs, and tolerate periods of standing, for example on walking tours, sightseeing stops, etc. Appropriate for most participants beginning with those who are moderately fit, lead semi-active lives, are comfortable participating in long days of activities, and expect some moderate physical activity.

Level 3: Active

Expectations: This tour requires a high level of physical activity. The tour includes well-paced walking tours, hikes, stairs, and moderate slopes with regular breaks. Up to 2-3 hours of walking during the trip. To fully take advantage of all this tour has to offer, guests need to be able to walk longer distances, climb several flights of stairs and navigate steps and uneven terrain walking for extended periods of time over more difficult terrain (e.g. cobblestones, city hills, stairs without handrails, limited or no access to elevators). Excursions require standing and walking for long periods of time where motorized vehicles may be prohibited. Appropriate for participants who are physically fit, expect a vigorous pace, and enjoy participating in two to three hours of physical activity per day.
