4. BUSINESS ITEMS

a) PARK DEDICATION RECOMMENDATION: 210 COUNTY ROAD B2

Staff reviewed the purpose, process, and options to satisfy Park Dedication with the Commission.

Staff provided the Commission background on a proposed subdivision that is planned for 210 County Road B2. The proposal is to divide one existing home lot into three lots (one existing, two new) for future development. The project qualifies for Park Dedication. The cash amount for the two additional units would be \$8,500 (\$4,250 per unit). The required land amount would be 10% of .99 acres or 0.099 acres. The proposed development is located in Constellation F of the Parks and Recreation system. There are no specific plans identified for parkland in this area.

Staff reminded the Commission of their role for Park Dedication, which is to review the proposed development in relation to the parks and recreation system plans and goals, and to make a recommendation on whether the City should accept land, cash, or a combination thereof to satisfy the Park Dedication requirement.

The developer was present at the meeting to answer any questions from the Commission. No questions were asked.

Commissioner J. Arneson relayed that he would support cash in lieu of land as the parcel does not abut existing parkland.

Commissioner Dahlstrom moved to recommend cash (\$8,500), in lieu of land, to satisfy Park Dedication for 210 County Road B2 to the City Council. Vice-Chair Beckman seconded.

b) PARKS AND RECREATION MANAGEMENT SOFTWARE REQUEST FOR PROPOSAL UPDATE

Staff explained that the City currently uses Active.net for its Recreation Management Software (RMS) needs, and has done so since 2005. Additionally, staff relayed that both customers and staff have discussed the need to review what RMS options are available for the City.

 - Allow more options to promote and market services
 - Expanded reports to understand diversity within services
- Next Steps
 - Issue a Request for Proposal ‘Summer 2024’
 - Potential rollout of the new system is preliminarily anticipated for 2025
 - Training and System Creation
 - Customer Communication – new accounts
 - Implementation

The Commission discussed the potential of utilizing beta testers throughout the RFP and product implementation process.

Commissioner Brown asked about data integration from ActiveNet to a new system. Staff responded that ActiveNet has acknowledged that they are able to provide reports that can be used to integrate current data into the new system. Staff did relay that they feel it would be beneficial to have user’s setup new accounts within the new database as there are many duplicate accounts in the current system.

The Commission discussed potential opportunities for new RMS software, including activity searches, calendar syncing, and filtering by location.

c) **DISCUSS PARK NAME OPTIONS FOR NEW PARK AT 2381 COUNTY ROAD B**

Staff provided a brief background on the new park located at 2381 County Road B, the Parks and Recreation Operating Policy #40 (Assigning Names to Facilities), and the process outlined by the Commission at the February 6, 2024 meeting for recommending a new name to the City Council.

Over 50 names recommendations were suggested via newsletter, social media, community meetings and website surveys.

The Commission discussed the appropriateness of naming the park after the previous owner of the parcel and if that would be in line with Operating Policy #40.

Commissioner J. Arneson shared that he liked the idea of a name that is more nature oriented.

Chair Matts-Benson shared that Honey “Bee” Park could be a play on words as the park is located on County Road B. The Commission discussed that it would be nice to incorporate bee’s into the park design and that may be hard as the park plan has already been finalized.

Commissioner Raygor shared that she liked the name Sunset Park.

Commissioner Boulton asked if the Dakota people were the indigenous group that originally inhabited the park area. Chair Matts-Benson relayed that she would research this questions.

The Commission discussed additional possible name options to add to the list of recommendations, including Hidden Hills, Oak Hills, Western, West End, and Old Oak Park.

Staff conveyed that the two existing oak trees may potentially not survive due to construction of the new development.

The Commission engaged in an activity where they placed stickers on their preferred park names in order to narrow down the list of recommendations.

Staff agreed to consolidate and distribute the narrowed-down list of recommended names, and the Commission agreed to discuss the reduced list of name options at the next meeting.

5. OTHER BUSINESS

a) DEPARTMENTAL UPDATES

- The Earth Day Celebration at the Harriet Alexander Nature Center was held on April 20. New educational activities included house plant bingo, ponding at the marsh, and presentations on pollinator gardens and healthy gardening.
- The annual Figure Skating Ice Show was held on April 18-20.
- Kite Day in the Park was held at Rosebrook Park on April 27. Over 100 kids participated in this free event.
- The following events have begun or will begin this week:
 - Adult softball leagues
 - Adult volleyball leagues
 - Youth outdoor kicker-slugger camps
- Designer Handbag Bingo at Cedarholm Community Building on May 11, 2024 (1:00 PM - 3:00 PM).
- The Roseville School of Dance recital will be on May 18, 2024 - May 19, 2024 at Roseville Area High School.
- The Lexington Park playground replacement request for proposal has been released. Additional details will be shared with the Commission at an upcoming meeting.
- A forestry update was provided to the City Council at their April 15, 2024 meeting.

- Due to limited availability, the tree sale is scheduled for fall 2024.
- The deer reduction program with the United States Department of Agriculture has concluded for 2023/2024, with a total of 23 deer removed.
- Commissioner J. Arneson shared that the repainted concrete benches and repaired swinging benches in Central Park look great and have been getting a lot of use. Staff relayed that due to the limited snow this winter, they were able to complete some deferred maintenance projects at many parks, including painting and repairing picnic tables, replacing stairs, and updating benches.

b) **OTHER NEW OR RELEVANT COMMUNICATION ITEMS**

Chair Matts-Benson reminded the Commission of the upcoming opportunity to represent the Parks and Recreation Commission by walking in the Rosefest Parade. Families are welcome to participate in the parade.

Chair Matts-Benson confirmed with staff that the Discover Your Park signup sheet for Commissioners will be sent out via e-mail.

Staff relayed that preparations are beginning for Rosefest. This year, the fireworks will not be on July 4 but will instead conclude the 'Party in the Park' event on Saturday, June 29. The event will include inflatables, food trucks, concert performances, and fireworks.

ITEM DESCRIPTION: Discuss Park Name Options for the New Park at 2381 County Road B.

Background

Per Parks and Recreation Operating Policy #40 (attachment 1), the Parks and Recreation Commission is charged with recommending names for new parks to the City Council. At the February 6, 2024 meeting, the Parks and Recreation Commission outlined a process for recommending a name for the new park at 2381 County Road B. Per the outlined process, name recommendations were sought via newsletter, social media, community meetings, and website surveys. Your packet includes a complete list of name suggestions (attachment 2)

At your May 7, 2024 meeting, the Commission discussed possible names and completed a ranking activity to winnow the list of names down to top candidates (attachment 3).

As a reminder, park names are selected based on the criteria outlined in Policy #40.

OPERATING POLICY # 40

DATE: October, 1988

POLICY TITLE: Assigning Names to City Facilities

PURPOSE: From time to time there is a need to name City of Roseville parks and recreation facilities. The adopted policy contains an orderly process for accomplishing this need.

DESCRIPTION:

The following policy adopted by the City Council on October 5, 1988, shall be used for assigning names to city Parks and Recreation facilities:

It shall be the policy of the City of Roseville to refer to the Parks and Recreation Commission, any activity involving the naming or changing of names of any city-owned parks or recreational facilities.

The Commission shall recommend to the City Council for approval, names for new sites, facilities or portions of facilities. This includes any changes in names to existing facilities.

The naming of parks and recreational facilities will be given consideration by the Parks and Recreation Commission based on the following factors:

- natural habitat, i.e., vegetation, terrain, animals, etc.
- geographic location, i.e., street names, directions, etc.
- appropriate non-descript terminology, i.e., acronyms or joining of two words or names or activities, etc.

Only under certain and exceptional circumstances will consideration be given to the names of individuals (alive or deceased) and/or organized groups, associations or businesses. To be considered the individual, group, association or business must have made a significant and exceptional contribution to the site involved or to the community as a whole. Such contributions, (immediate or deferred) should be for recreation purposes and may include:

- substantial financial donations
- substantial property donations

In addition, recognition plaques, memorial plaques or dedications may be placed throughout the Park and Recreation system by the Parks and Recreation director and with the recommendation of the Parks and Recreation Commission.

Standing Oaks Park because, the one thing of concern of the Shannons when they sold the property was that the beautiful Oaks would be destroyed, and thankfully at least two were saved.

3/3/2024	DAVE GEHRKE PARK	Dave grew up in Lauderdale and graduated from Alexander Ramsey High School and Bethel College. He taught art at Columbia Heights High School for 30 years, and coached hockey and football. Late in his career, he was the head football coach at Ramsey. I got to know Dave in 7th Grade at Capitol View Junior High School; he was my first hockey coach, and that began a friendship that has now spanned 63 years. He not only contributed to my hockey career, but as a now-retired Lutheran pastor, I recognize how Dave's Christian faith informed my own emerging faith in those years. Dave and his wife Clara live at RosePointe Senior living in Roseville.
3/3/2024	Woodland Park	nature.
3/3/2024	Natureview Park	The natural amenities which include the woodland and native prairie plants!
3/3/2024	Shannon Park	Named after the family that owned the land the park and homes are now on
3/3/2024	Gentle Pond Park	Cute pond to enjoy
3/3/2024	Rosita Park	It means "a small rose" in Spanish and seems fitting for a smaller park (compared to others in the city) and also ties in with the name Roseville.
3/4/2024	"West End," "Sunset," "Eventide," "Twilight," "Half-Light"	This park is on the west end of Roseville. On the west end, we see sunsets. The various names have something to suggest it is on the west end of Roseville where we can see sunsets.

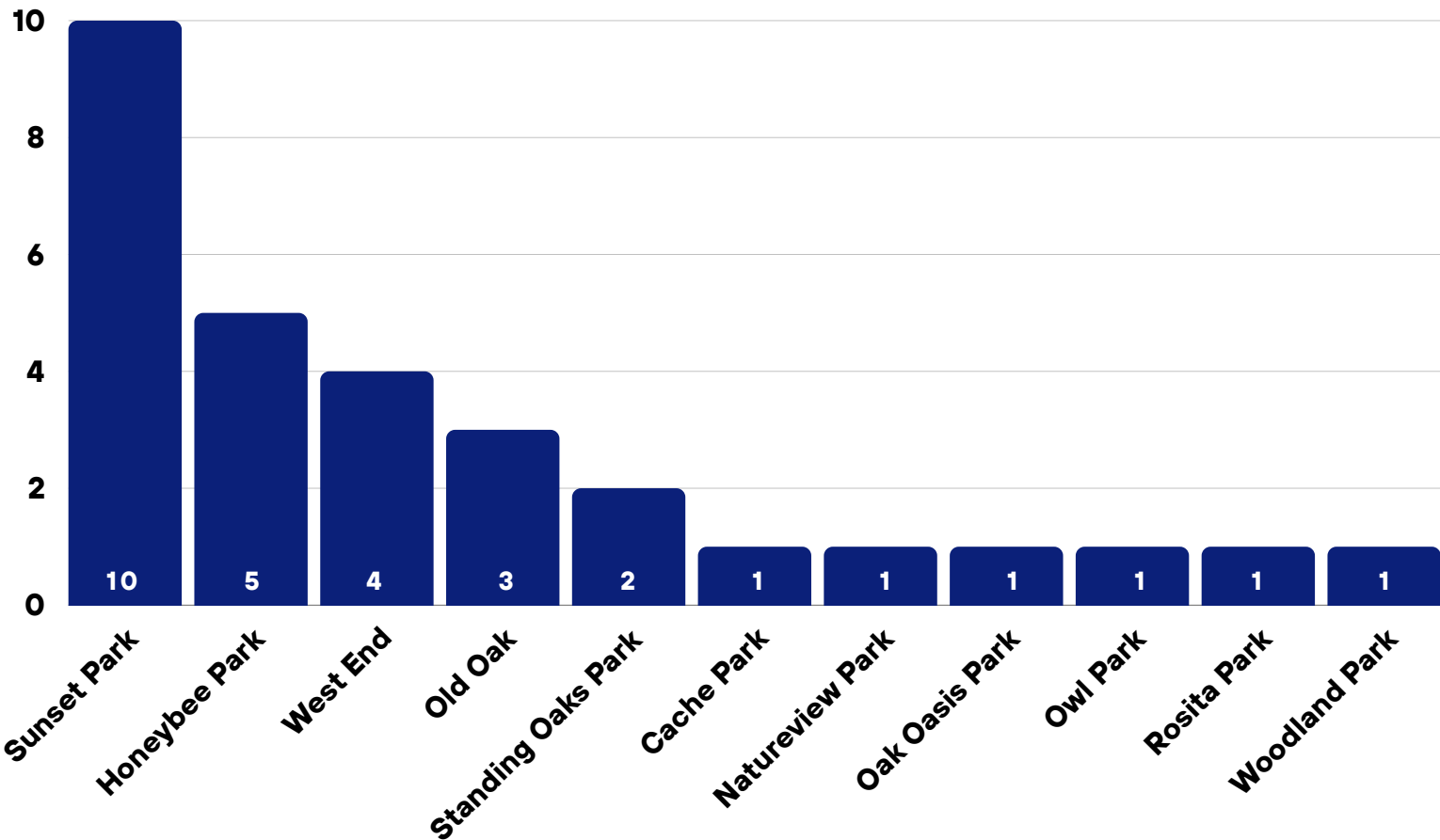

ITEM DESCRIPTION: Discuss Possible Parks and Recreation Needs Assessment

Background

A parks and recreation needs assessment is a tool that communities use to measure community satisfaction with Parks and Recreation service offerings, and to develop an understanding of current community needs. According to the National Recreation and Parks Association:

*Community needs assessments should give you **three** crucial pieces of feedback:*

*(a) **activation**: how are your community's residents currently using your facilities, programming and parks?*

*(b) **satisfaction**: how satisfied are they with the above?*

*(c) **needs**: beyond satisfaction levels, is your agency's "finger on the pulse" of your community's priorities regarding health and wellness, socialization and connection, out-of-school time programming and any other essential needs?*

This information can be crucial in evaluating possible changes to facilities and service offerings.

The last parks and recreation specific community needs assessment was conducted in 2011. In recent years, both the Parks and Recreation Commission and the City Council have expressed an interest in conducting an updated needs assessment. Most recently, a needs assessment has been discussed as a helpful tool in evaluating options for the replacement of amenities that could be lost with the possible completion of the Campus Master Plan on the current Veterans Park.

Staff will provide a preliminary summary of the benefits of a community needs assessment, discuss some possible strategies for data collection, and solicit feedback from the commission regarding a possible needs assessment. It is important to note that funding is not currently identified in the 2024 budget for a needs assessment.

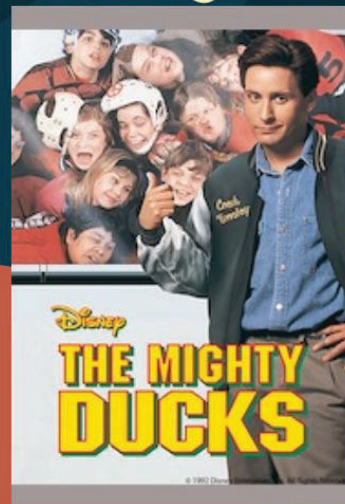

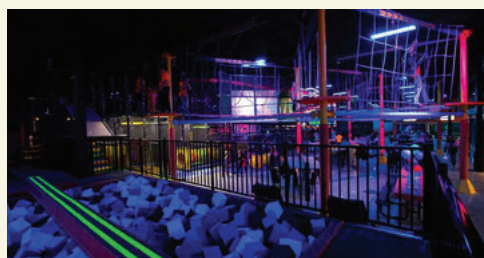

PRESCHOOL ages 3-5

Beginner I Teaches basic movement and tumbling skills. Helps to improve body awareness, motor skills, coordination, balance and listening skills. Uses modified equipment with a fun and creative approach to learning.

Beginner II For beginner level preschoolers who have previously taken gymnastics class. Gymnast should have mastered the skills from Beginner I. Must be able to perform a forward roll and donkey kicks on the floor, and walk on a low balance beam unassisted.

Intermediate For preschool gymnasts who have mastered the Beginner II skills. Must be able to perform a bridge on the floor, and walk on the high balance beam. Will begin to transfer skills to the regulation equipment.

Advanced Advanced level class for gymnasts ages 4-6 who have mastered the skills from the Intermediate class. Must have good listening skills and be able to perform a forward roll and cartwheel unassisted. Will continue to transition skills to the regulation equipment.

Hot Shots/Dyno's Accelerated classes for gymnasts ages 4-8, designed to speed the transition into competitive gymnastics. Gymnasts are chosen from our preschool and instructional classes based on strength, flexibility, and a desire to make a commitment to gymnastics. Gymnasts may register with permission only.

INSTRUCTIONAL ages 6-14

Beginner I Emphasis is on tumbling skills with exposure to the balance beam, uneven bars, vault and dance. This class is suited for students who have never taken a gymnastics class before.

Beginner II For beginner level gymnasts who have previously taken a gymnastics class. Gymnast should have mastered skills from Beginner I. Must be able to perform a cartwheel on floor and walk on a high balance beam unassisted. Basic skills are taught on all events.

Intermediate Should have mastered skills from Beginner II. Must be able to perform a handstand forward roll and round-off on the floor and a pullover on the bars. Gymnasts will learn to perfect their basic skills as well as learn more advanced skill on all events.

Advanced I For gymnasts who have mastered skills from the intermediate level. Must be able to perform a backbend-kickover and front limber on the floor, and a back hip circle on the bars. There is an emphasis on strength, flexibility and form.

Advanced II For gymnasts who have mastered skills from the Advanced I level. Must be able to perform a front and back handspring on the floor and a cartwheel on the high balance beam. Prepares the gymnast for high school competition.
