ITEM DESCRIPTION: Overview of Parks and Recreation Friends Groups

Background

Friends Groups are vital community-driven organizations that act as stewards and advocates for parks and recreation systems. Typically composed of dedicated volunteers, these groups share a passion for preserving, enhancing, and promoting park spaces. Friends Groups serve as a crucial bridge between the community and public park systems by supplementing municipal efforts through fundraising, advocacy, volunteerism, and project support.

The importance of Friends Groups lies in their ability to significantly amplify the impact of park and recreation agencies in several key ways:

- **Fundraising and Financial Support:** Friends Groups often secure substantial funds to support park maintenance, facility improvements, and special projects that might otherwise exceed public budget limitations.
- **Volunteer Contributions:** Members dedicate time to initiatives such as invasive species removal, trail maintenance, and event organization, directly enhancing park environments and user experiences.
- **Community Advocacy:** Acting as the voice of the community, Friends Groups promote the value of parks to residents, businesses, and local officials. Their grassroots efforts shape public opinion and help secure critical political and financial support.
- **Long-term Vision, Engagement, and Sustainability:** By collaborating with park and recreation staff, Friends Groups contribute to shaping and sustaining a vision for the future of parks, ensuring their relevance and utility for generations to come.

In Roseville, three Friends Groups—the Friends of the OVAL Foundation, Friends of Roseville Parks (FOR Parks), and the Roseville Central Park Foundation—play an essential role in supporting our city's parks and recreation system. Each group brings unique contributions:

- *Friends of the OVAL Foundation* focuses on maintaining and enhancing the John Rose MN OVAL and Skating Center.
- *FOR Parks* leads system-wide fundraising and community-building initiatives to beautify and enhance Roseville's 33 parks.
- *Roseville Central Park Foundation* dedicates efforts to the development and continual improvement of Central Park as a premier urban green space.

Through their collective efforts, these groups have significantly enhanced the quality of our facilities while fostering stronger connections between our parks and the community. At your upcoming meeting, staff will discuss:

- The positive impact Friends Groups have on our parks system and the broader Roseville community.
- An overview of each Friends Group, including their history, significant contributions, and future projects.
- The challenges facing Friends Groups as they adapt to changing volunteer behaviors and

community expectations.

Additionally, staff will seek feedback from the Commission on how to raise awareness of the Friends Groups and how the City can best support their ongoing success in the face of behavioral and societal shifts.

RE: Copper Theft to Central Park Lights

On the morning of November 17, 2024, it was discovered that copper wiring had been stolen from 27 of the 28 lights surrounding Bennett Lake in Central Park. This theft has left the trail around the lake without lighting, creating safety and usability concerns for residents. The Police Department is actively investigating the incident.

Copper wire thefts have been reported across the metro area, and this unfortunate incident highlights the vulnerabilities within our infrastructure. Given the urgency of restoring lighting to ensure public safety, and the importance of this amenity for our community, we initiated an emergency repair on November 21, 2024.

Emergency Repairs

To address the issue promptly, we engaged a trusted contractor who is experienced in similar repairs. We also spoke with other cities that have experienced copper theft and discussed mitigation strategies that have been effective. The approved emergency repair plan includes:

- Repair of impacted Central Park lights
- Modifications to impacted light fixtures to deter future theft

The quoted cost for these repairs is \$85,531.78, although final costs may vary due to the damage caused by the wire's violent removal. This unbudgeted repair will be paid for from the Parks Maintenance Fund.

Work is scheduled to begin the week of December 2, 2024, with completion anticipated by mid-December. This repair has been authorized by the City Manager under emergency provisions to avoid delays, particularly with the holidays approaching.

Deterrence of Future Theft

As mentioned, modifications will be made to the repaired fixtures to make future theft more difficult. Additionally, staff are pursuing installation of additional cameras in Central Park and options to retrofit other (non-impacted) fixtures to deter additional copper wire theft. However, initial analysis is that some of these modifications are costly and may only marginally decrease the threat of copper theft. It is important to note that since 2019 neighboring cities have pursued a vast array of deterrence methods with only limited success. According to a recent article in the Star Tribune (August 18, 2024) "crews welded access panels shut, electrified utility wires during the day, installed silent alarms and used less valuable wire. Those fixes did little to stop thieves who stripped copper wire from thousands of lights..."

Based on conversation with neighboring cities, it is unwise to publicly share the specifics of deterrence methods that will be utilized in the park.

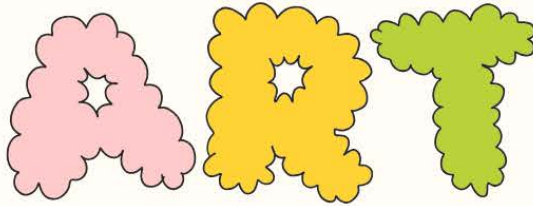
