1. Introduction / Roll Call

Chair Ficek called the meeting to order at approximately 6:30 p.m., and at his request, Public Works Director Jesse Freihammer called the roll.

Present: Chair Bryant Ficek (arrived at 6:35); Vice Chair Edwin Hodder; Members Jarrod Cicha, and Daniel Fergus; and Youth Commissioner Carson Bauer

Absent: Members Allison Luongo, Sarah Rudolf, and Des Mueller; and Youth Commissioner Alexi Jendro (Excused)

Staff Present: Public Works Director Jesse Freihammer; Assistant Public Works Director/City Engineer Jennifer Lowry, Parks Superintendent Jim Taylor, and Sustainability Specialist Noelle Bakken

2. Public Comments

3. Approval of February 25, 2025, Meeting Minutes

Prior to tonight's meeting, the comments and corrections to the draft minutes had been submitted by PWETC commissioners, and those revisions were incorporated into the draft presented in the meeting materials.

Member Fergus moved, and Member Cicha seconded approval of the February 25, 2025, meeting minutes as presented.

32 **4. Communication Items**

33 Assistant Public Works Director/City Engineer Lowry provided a brief review and
34 update on projects and maintenance activities listed in the staff report dated
35 March 18, 2025.

36
37 Ms. Lowry explained that the City Council had approved the contract for
38 consultants to explore options for the license, passport center, and dance studio.
39 She noted that several pathway projects, including Lexington Avenue and Wagner
40 Street pathways, were set to begin this year. A public meeting was tentatively
41 scheduled for May 1 regarding the Hamline Avenue project, and the County was
42 working on a stormwater project at Hamline Avenue and Clarmar Lane. Several
43 road, watermain, and trail projects were planned for next year.

44
45 Ms. Lowry discussed the implementation of wayfinding signs along county
46 corridors, similar to Saint Paul park zones. The City was working with Xcel on a
47 new streetlight policy that was passed in 2024. The bike lane project, including the
48 Hamline Bike Lane Demonstration Project, was underway, with Dale Street
49 expected to be finished by the end of the year. She mentioned the application for a
50 new equity-based water efficiency grant and the ongoing work on the Green To Go
51 project with University of Minnesota students.

52
53 Parks Superintendent Taylor explained the property boundary surveys in Reservoir
54 Woods, marking the property boundaries of the cemetery leased by the City. He
55 explained that the survey company placed the signs incorrectly, and the City was
56 working to correct them.

57
58 Vice Chair Hodder discussed the impact of the signs on park users.

59
60 Mr. Taylor discussed the process of correcting the signs.

61
62 **5. Winter Plowing Update**

63 Public Works Director Jesse Freihammer provided a detailed update on winter
64 plowing operations, including the City's ordinance prohibiting parking on streets
65 after two inches of snow. The City's approach to plowing, including the use of brine
66 mixture for pre-treatment, was also discussed.

67
68 Mr. Freihammer explained the challenges of plowing during heavy, wet snow
69 events and the impact of temperature changes on plowing operations. He reviewed
70 the City's routes and equipment, including the use of tandem axle plow trucks,
71 single axle plow trucks, and front-end loaders.

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73 Member Fergus inquired about the efficiency of brine solutions in reducing salt
74 usage.

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76 Mr. Freihammer confirmed that brine is more efficient at melting snow and ice than
77 traditional rock salt.

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Member Fergus also asked about mailbox recommendations and the impact of snow plowing on driveways.

Mr. Freihammer explained the challenges of plowing around existing snow banks and the impact of residents' driveway maintenance on snow removal.

6. Less Mow Summer/Pollinator Update

Sustainability Specialist Bakken updated the transition from the “No Mow May” initiative to a more year-round approach to pollinator-friendly lawn care. The City was moving away from the “No Mow May” initiative due to its lack of additional pollinator benefits and the stress it places on lawns.

Ms. Bakken discussed recommendations for responsible mowing, planting native flowers and shrubs, and using fine fescue instead of Kentucky Bluegrass. She indicated the City’s website was updated to reflect the new approach to pollinator-friendly lawn care, including resources for water conservation and native planting.

Ms. Bakken announced a native plant and seed sale planned for May 24, with an online portal for pre-ordering. The sale will include various kits and seed mixes, with prices set to be competitive with retail prices. The goal was to encourage residents to plant more native plants to create habitat and forage for pollinators. She noted the sale would be structured similarly to the City’s tree sale, with plants and seed mixes available for pickup at City Hall.

7. Bike Plan

Assistant Public Works Director/City Engineer Lowry provided an update on the bike plan, including the involvement of MnDOT consultants and public engagement. She explained the plan aims to create a safe, comfortable, and accessible bicycle network for all ages and abilities.

Ms. Lowry explained that feedback from public engagement and bike audits has been incorporated into the plan, which includes a detailed map and priority ranking criteria.

Ms. Lowery explained that a demonstration project on Hamline Avenue was planned, involving the addition of on-road bike lanes and removing right-turn lanes. She explained the demonstration project on Hamline Avenue, which included the addition of on-road bike lanes and the elimination of right-turn lanes. The project aims to improve safety and comfort for cyclists and pedestrians, with support from the school district and the county. The project will be constructed mid to late May, with plans to document its impact before and after implementation. The goal would be to create a sustainable and effective bike land that could be replicated in other areas if successful.

123 Ms. Lowry discussed the comprehensive nature of the active transportation plan,
124 including engineering, enforcement, and education elements. She noted the draft
125 plan included recommendations for potential funding sources and toward zero
126 deaths vision policies, with room for education and engagement elements.
127

128 Chair Ficek explained that he appreciated the committee's involvement and that it
129 started a great conversation with stakeholders. He inquired about a timeline for
130 reviewing the final report and ensuring the plan was not left on a shelf.
131

132 Mr. Freihammer explained that the pathway master plan was funded for the next
133 year and suggested that it be refreshed every three to four years.
134

135 Chair Ficek agreed not to let the plan sit for ten years.
136

137 Ms. Lowry highlighted the plan's potential for funding applications and creating a
138 CIP line item for new pathways.
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140 Chair Ficek asked about public involvement and the plan's release for public
141 comment.
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143 Ms. Lowry explained the process of incorporating committee comments and
144 targeting public engagement.
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146 Ms. Lowry discussed the plan's public engagement strategy, including targeted
147 community conversations and a one-page summary. She explained the need for pre-
148 installation counts and measures of success.
149

150 Chair Ficek asked about the plan's integration with county projects.
151

152 Ms. Lowry explained the county's involvement and the iterative process.
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154 Mr. Freihammer mentioned ongoing county projects and the supportive
155 relationship with the county.
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157 Chair Ficek raised concerns about summer maintenance and the cleanliness of bike
158 paths, suggesting targeted education tools. He shared examples from Ames, Iowa,
159 of a comprehensive safety tool for different modes of transportation.
160

161 Ms. Lowry mentioned the state's new requirement for biking and walking safety
162 classes and the development of materials by a consultant. She noted that MnDOT
163 hosted the current bike plan website and would be transitioned to the city's site.
164

165 **8. Election of Officers** 166

167 Public Works Director Freihammer announced the need to re-elect officers per City
168 Code, starting with the chair.

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Chair Ficek expressed willingness to continue in his role as Chair.

Vice-Chair Hodder indicated he was also willing to continue as Vice-Chair.

No one on the Commission opposed it.

The following are updates to projects and other activities happening in Roseville since the last commission meeting:

Roseville Public Works project updates:

- Maintenance Operation Center (MOC) / License & Passport Centers (LPC) / Dance Studio
 - An RFP to hire BKV Architects to perform more analysis of LPC/Dance Studios options was approved on March 17.
- Lexington Avenue Pathway
 - The project is currently in design and includes Lexington Avenue, between County Road B and TH 36, for construction in 2025. Tree removals are complete.
- Wagner/Western & Tamarack Pathways
 - Pathways for the Wagner Street to Western Avenue cul-de-sac connection, and Western Avenue cul-de-sac to Tamarack Park pathway are in design for construction in 2025. Tree removals are complete.
- Hamline Avenue
 - Construction of pathway from County Road C to Josephine Road in 2026 will begin design in 2025 and be constructed in coordination with the water and road work noted below. Kickoff meeting with public May 1.
 - Resurfacing from County Road C to County Road C2 in 2026 will be designed and lead by Roseville and paid by Ramsey County.
 - Upsizing of the watermain from Josephine Road to Glenhill Road/Arden Hills. Paid primarily by Arden Hills.
- Twin Lakes Trail Phase 2
 - Easement being negotiated with property owner. Tree removal is partially complete. Trail construction planned for 2025.
- Dale/Owasso Lift Station Rehab
 - Minor grading and tree removal complete. Construction underway.
- 2025 Sewer Lining
 - Contract award going to Council April 21.
- Booster Station Phase 4 Improvements
 - Improvements likely to include new roof, tuckpointing, thermal and acoustical treatments and other facility updates. Roof work will be done in coordination with solar install. Bid package to be released likely later this year.

- 2025 Pavement Management Project
 - Bid opening scheduled for April 21.
- Wayfinding Signage
 - Pedestrian level signs are being manufactured, and permits being obtained for installation summer 2025.
- Lighting
 - New streetlights installation underway by Xcel per City request, based on new lighting policy.
 - Staff is working to replace Centre Pointe Drive and Arthur Street lighting with a new contract with Xcel for later in 2025.
- Bike Plan
 - Edits are being made to the draft. Next steps will include review by PWET and the Parks Commission, and the public.
 - The demonstration project, intended to be the addition of buffer and bollard-protected bike lanes on Hamline Avenue, between County Road B and County Road B2, is anticipated to be installed the week of May 12 or 19.

Other agency project updates:

- Ramsey County
 - Dale Street from Lovell Avenue into St. Paul
 - Work has resumed on the mill, overlay and 4 to 3 lanes restriping.
 - Hamline Avenue/Clarmar Lane Storm Sewer
 - County to add to and replace existing storm sewer to address flooding and aging infrastructure in Fall 2025.
 - County Road D from Highercrest Road to 88
 - City reviewed draft plans for ADA and pavement improvements (mill and overlay) for 2025 construction.
 - County Road C 4-3 Conversion from Lexington to 35E and bridge over railroad
 - 4-3 lane conversion with mill and overlay scheduled for 2026.
 - Bridge redecking or replacement received federal funding – schedule TBD.
- MnDOT
 - TH 36 Multimodal Study Document
 - Final report has been drafted, and staff will let PWET know when it is released.
 - Snelling Design from TH 36 to Grey Fox Road
 - In design for 2026 resurfacing and will include off-road pathway west of Snelling Avenue from Lydia Avenue to the north.
 - TH 280 Design from Wabash Avenue in St. Paul to I35 W
 - In design for 2026 resurfacing.
- Other
 - G Line (Metro Transit)
 - Planning and design continue for construction 2026-2028
 - Flood Mitigation Project (Capitol Region Watershed District)

- Trout Brook Interceptor (TBI) Detailed Modeling Project identified potential flood mitigation opportunities at Roseville Lutheran Church and at Falcon Heights United Church. Design and estimates are being developed for further discussion.

Engineering Updates:

- Staff submitted a grant application for Met Council's new Equity-Focused Water Efficiency Grant Pilot Program.
- All of Roseville's \$53,000 for the Private Sewer I&I Grant have been encumbered by successful residential applicants, with several already on a waitlist.
- May 18-24, 2025 is National Public Work's Week

Sustainability Updates:

- Green To Go ordinance implementation continues. We are also meeting quarterly with other metro cities with packaging ordinances to discuss challenges, updates, and regulatory changes, including the upcoming state law that will require all compostable packaging to be BPI certified and labeled starting January 2026.
- Roseville is hosting a native plant sale this year in partnership with MNL. Plant and seed mix sales are open now through May 15, with pickup on May 31 at the maintenance garage.
- Roseville staff will attend the new Ramsey County Environmental Center Open House on Thursday, April 24. Staff will be promoting our Green To Go ordinance and giving away kitchen countertop food scraps bins.
- Roseville staff will be participating in Anpetu Teca's first sustainability sale, promoting recycling and reuse as well as our native plant sale, on Saturday April 26.
- Roseville was awarded a Local Climate Action Planning grant from the MPCA in the amount of \$49,975. Staff gathered multiple proposals from consultants to assist with our climate action planning process and plans to retain a consultant starting in late May to begin work on the plan.

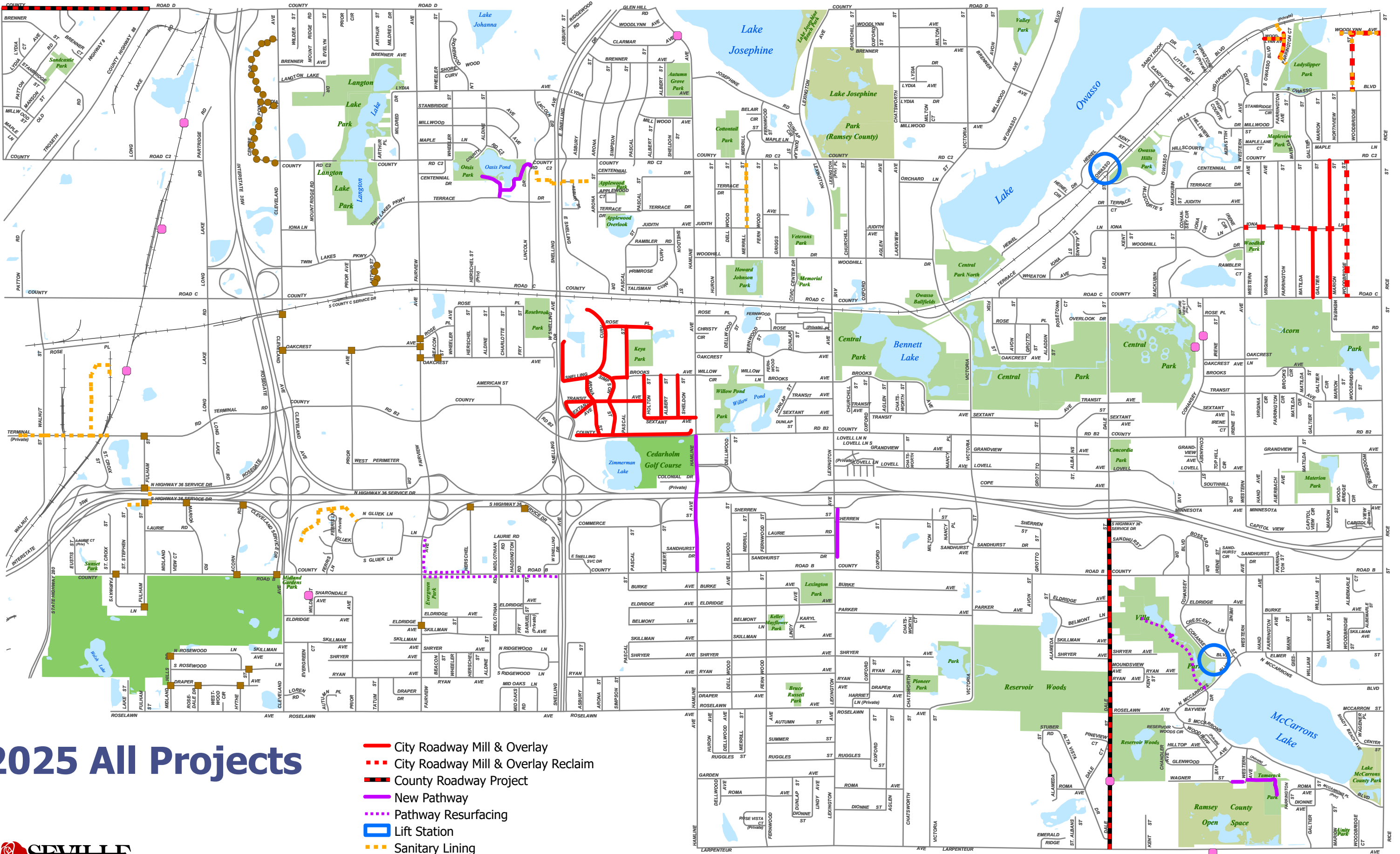
Maintenance Updates:

- Road Restrictions lifted April 16, 2025
- Street and Storm
 - Leaf site gates open for *residential leaves only*
 - Transitioning maintenance equipment from winter to summer operations.
 - 4th compost turning complete April 10, 2025
 - Asphalt patching began April 16, 2025.
 - Spring street sweeping completed.
 - Citywide turf damage repair completed from winter operations.
 - Ongoing storm sewer maintenance, sign work, and assisting with water main repairs.
- Water and Sanitary Sewer
 - Continued inspections for water service line inventory.
 - Five watermain breaks occurred in the month of March.
 - Walsh Lift station variable frequency drive (VFD) installation is complete.

- 2025 Sewer cleaning and Televising are underway.
- All 6 I-Hydrants have been installed.
- Continued underground locates, weekly lift station inspections, collection of water samples, and replacing water meters and MIUs.

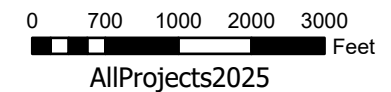

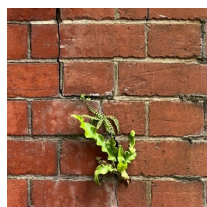

I frequently lean on many of the below tactics to keep my chin up when the world feels discouraging. Note that these are not a substitute for proper mental health treatment and therapy, but additional tools to keep in your toolbox—I am not a therapist and what works for me may not work for you.

- **Fully feel your emotions, and learn how to complete the stress cycle.** Scrolling through social media and news headlines can send us through emotional whiplash, and can make our brains feel like we're constantly under threat. Make sure you take time to process what you're seeing, and complete the stress cycle with a good cry, a good laugh, or moving your body in a way that works for you.
- **Seek out good news.** There's a reason I always include good climate news in these newsletters! Distressing headlines get more clicks, so sometimes you have to work to find the positivity. Great things are still happening, and there are people working towards the greater good. Make sure you pay attention!
- **Practice “stubborn optimism” as the “necessary input for meeting a challenge.”** This is a direct quote from the book [Stubborn Optimism](#) by Christiana Figueres and Tom Rivett-Carnac. I define stubborn optimism as a verb, working towards the greater good despite the headwinds we may encounter.
- **Embrace joy.** Know what types of things make you feel joyful, silly, and free, and make time for them. When you're engaging in those things, stay present and notice how you feel in the moment.
- **Rest.** When you are tired and/or burned out, you won't be helpful to yourself or anyone. Take the time to recharge your batteries and disconnect.
- **Think beyond the present.** What I mean by this is contextualize our current moment within a long arc of history (both past and future), and know what kind of a future you want to create. Zen master Norma Wong writes “**what we cannot imagine is more difficult to create.**”
- **Lean into your local community.** Our local connections, or what is sometimes called “social capital,” are critical to creating a healthy and connected community. [This NY Times quiz](#) is a good start to think about your social relationships.

Ramsey County Environmental Center Officially Open!



As the sun peeks through the clouds, snow begins to melt and the temperature warms, you may find yourself in spring cleaning mode. Lucky for you, Ramsey County opened a brand new Environmental Center on April 1st! At 29,421 square feet, this new facility will make it easier for residents to reduce, reuse, repair, and recycle.

This building not only enhances environmental health services to better meet the needs of residents but also reaffirms Ramsey County's commitment to sustainability, reuse, and supporting natural and native landscapes and habitats:

- **The building is powered and operated by geothermal and solar energy sources:**
 - **Geothermal:** 42 wells, each roughly 150 feet deep, which will generate 412,560 BTU in heating and 786,240 BTU in cooling.
 - **Solar:** 221 panels, 90kW array
 - Outlets are designed to reduce phantom energy (electricity being used by a device that is plugged in but turned off), and all lighting is on motion sensors
- **Sustainable landscaping:**
 - 2,300 tons of food scrap compost used across the project site, helping retain water
 - Prioritized protecting large trees, and smaller trees that were removed are used as wildlife habitat in the stormwater pond
 - Native plants and insect hotels to attract pollinators
 - 76 trees and 453 shrubs planted
- **Water quality, conservation, and protection:**
 - Installation of a stormwater retention pond that serves half of the property
 - Rain chain and rain barrels for catching rooftop rainwater
 - **Closed collection drip, or floor drain**, throughout the household hazardous waste (HHW) drive-through that has no outlet. That means it is completely self-contained, preventing chemicals and oils contaminating stormwater or sanitary sewer system.
- **Recycled and sustainably-sourced materials** throughout the building's interior and exterior:
 - Exterior [picnic tables and patio furniture](#) produced by [Vestre](#), a manufacturer of urban furniture
 - Patio pavers salvaged from roads in the Twin Cities that were removed during road rebuilds
 - Shelving end caps in the reuse room made from Green Ash lumber from City of Minnetonka
 - Walking trail loop around the stormwater pond is made from recycled asphalt

The Environmental Center is located at 1700 Kent Street, and is open Tues-Fri 11am-6pm, and Sat 9am-4pm.

Roseville pivots away from "Less Mow May"

In our ongoing efforts to support native pollinators and provide habitat, based on new scientific evidence, Roseville is moving away from support of Less Mow May to affirm and promote year-round pollinator support efforts. [We've updated our yard care web page](#) to include more resources about supporting pollinators in your backyard, including tips about responsible mowing practices and water conservation.

We still have "Less Mow May" yard signs and don't want them to go to waste! As such, we have stickers to add to your signs that say "summer." Look for an email about when the stickers will be available soon!

To kick off our new direction, **[Roseville will be offering a native plant sale to residents in late May](#)**. Residents will be able to purchase plant kits or seed mixes at a low cost. 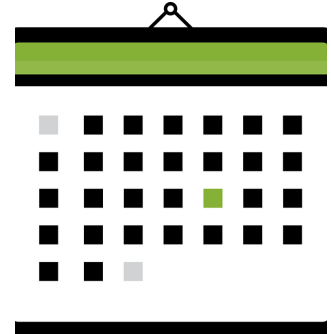

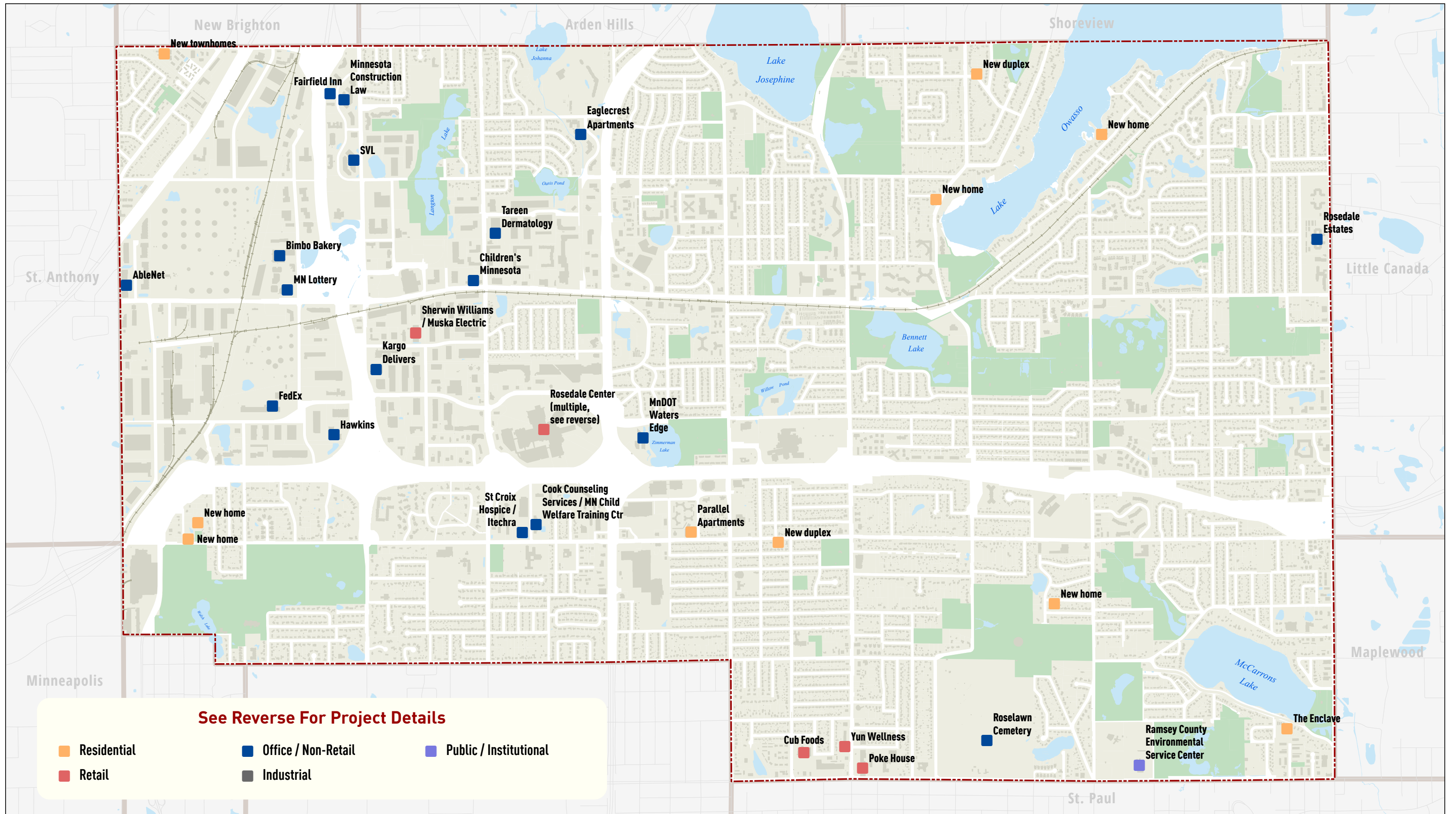

ITEM DESCRIPTION: Dark Skies - U of M Student Group Presentation

Background

Light pollution can be harmful to humans' circadian rhythms and disrupt wildlife migration and behavior, but can also be reduced with proper fixtures, temperature color, and distribution. "Dark Sky" compliant lighting and policies are designed to minimize excess light pollution as much as possible.

Roseville's City Code addresses commercial lighting but is outdated and lacks residential guidelines. Students from the University of Minnesota researched Dark Sky policies and ordinances and compiled a set of recommendations for Roseville as part of their semester project.

Recommendation

Receive presentation and discuss recommendations to update Roseville lighting code.

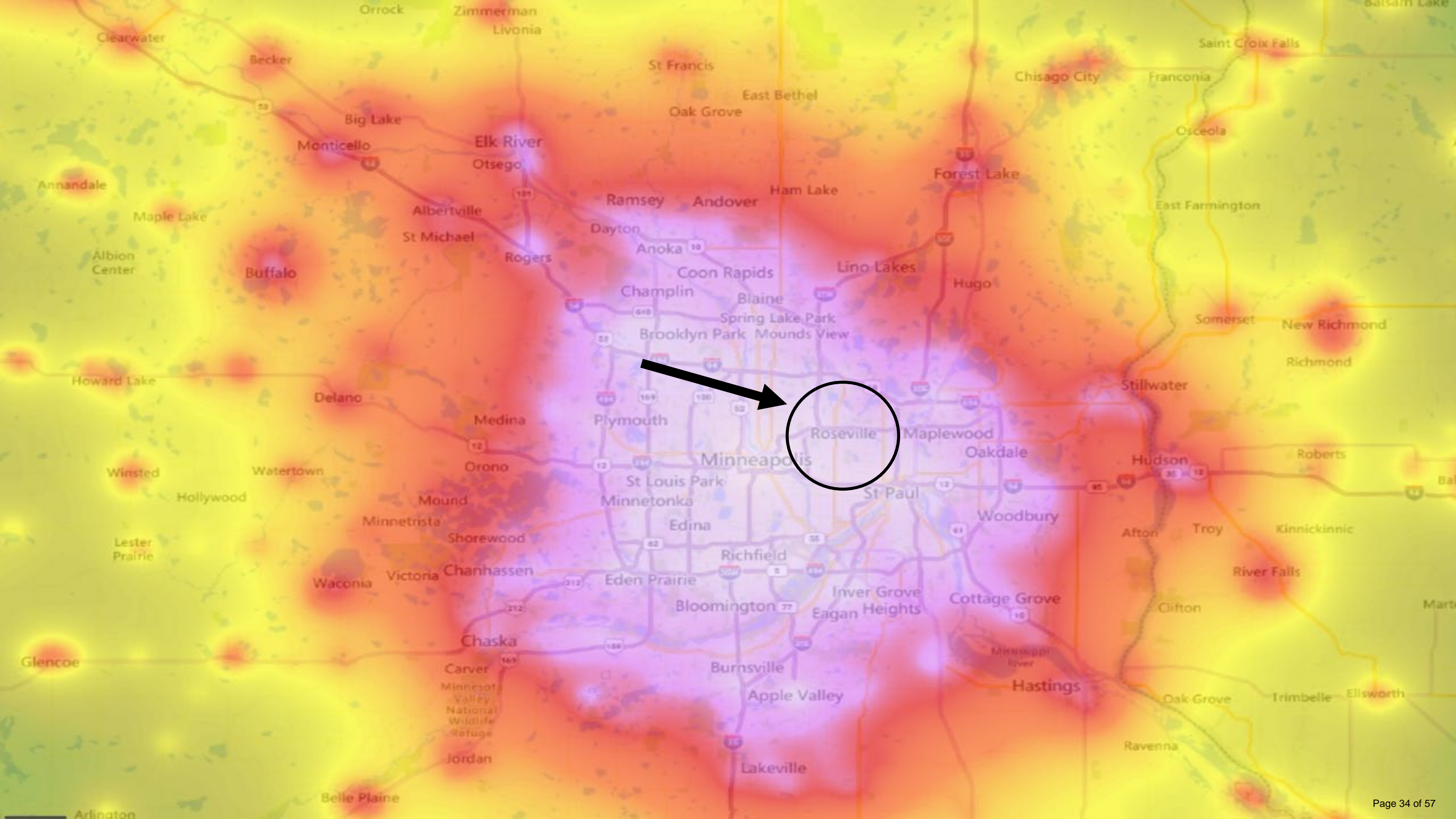

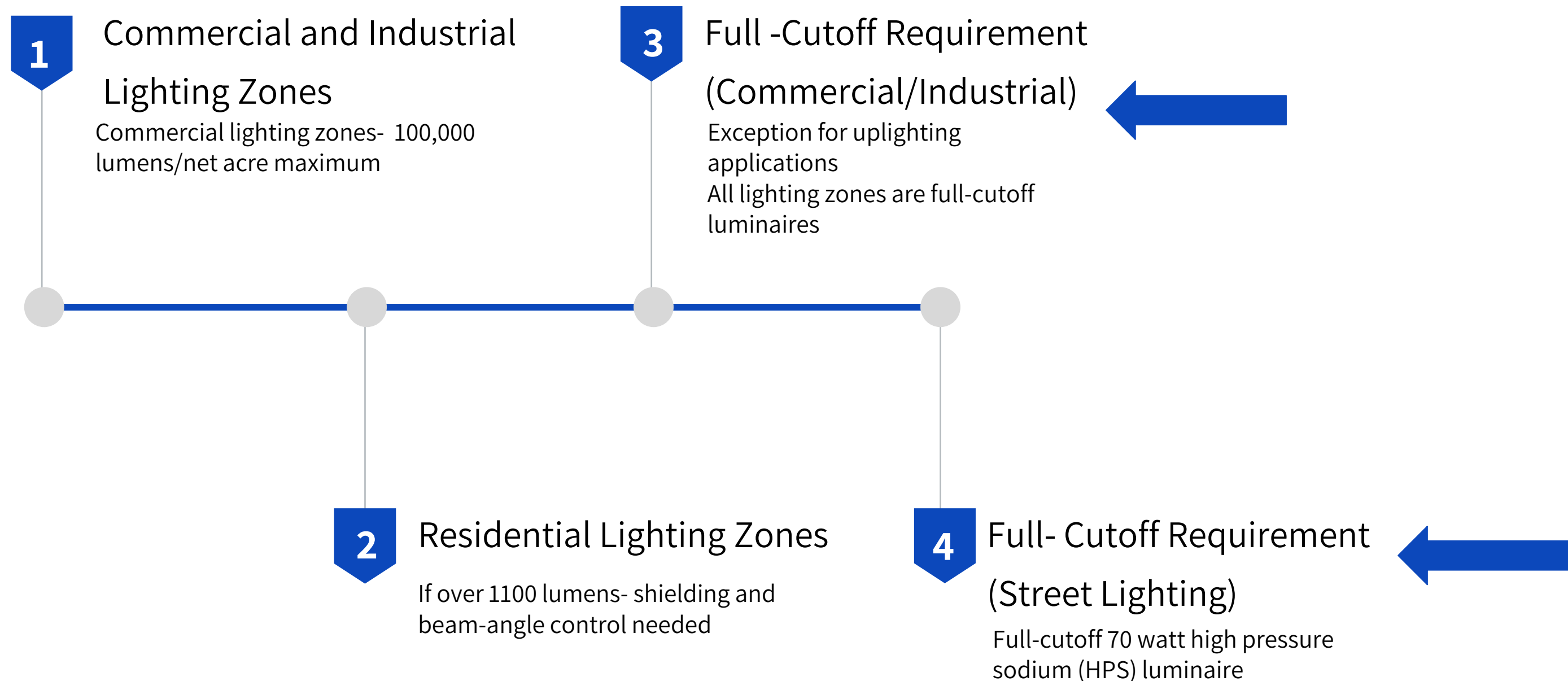

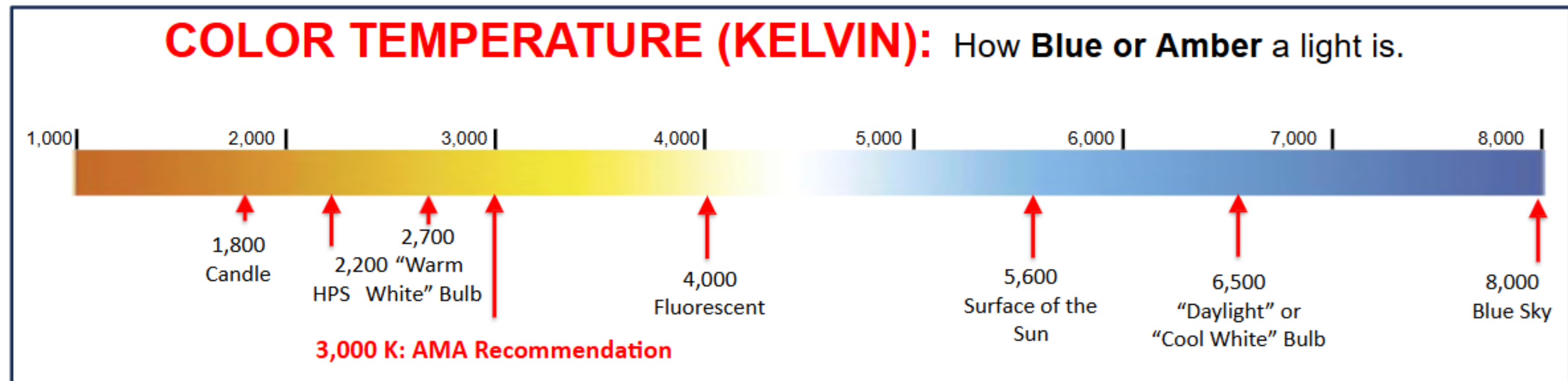

ITEM DESCRIPTION: Deferred Assessment Policy Update

Background

Minnesota State Statute § 435.193 allows for deferral of special assessments if the City adopts an ordinance or resolution establishing standards and guidelines for determining the existence of a hardship and for determining the existence of a disability. Roseville adopted such an ordinance most recently in 1981. In 2008, the State added military personnel as eligible for the deferrals. Staff wants to discuss this with the Commission prior to taking the topic before City Council to consider adoption of an update.

Pursuant to due call and notice thereof, a regular meeting of the City Council of the City of Roseville, Minnesota, was duly held at the City Hall in said City on Monday, the 27th day of July, 1981, at 7:30 o'clock p.m.

The following members were present: Mayor Demos, Councilmen Curley, Kehr, Johnson and Franke

and the following were absent: None

Councilman Curley introduced the following resolution and moved its adoption:

Resolution No. 7216

RESOLUTION RELATING TO DEFERRAL
OF SPECIAL ASSESSMENTS FOR SENIOR CITIZENS

WHEREAS, Minn. Stat. 435.193 authorizes municipalities to provide for the deferral of special assessments for senior citizens 65 years of age or older if the payment of those special assessments would create a hardship for the senior citizen property owner; and

WHEREAS, Minn. Stat. 435.193, as amended, authorizes municipalities to provide for the deferral of special assessments for persons retired by virtue of a permanent and total disability if the payment of those special assessments would create a hardship for the retired and disabled property owner; and

WHEREAS, the City Council believes that it is the best interest of all of the citizens of the City of Roseville to establish a procedure for the deferral of special assessments for senior citizens and certain retired disabled persons where a hardship exists.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED by the City Council of the City of Roseville, Minnesota, as follows:

1. Establishment of Deferral: Pursuant to Minn. Stat. 435.193 et seq., special assessment installment payments payable by senior citizens and persons retired by virtue of permanent and total disability are deferred if payment of such installments would create a hardship.

2. Criteria: In determining whether or not a person is eligible for deferral of special assessment installment payments, the following criteria are established:

A. Senior Citizens.

(1) Senior citizens special assessment hardship deferral applies to special assessments levied after June 27, 1977.

(2) Senior citizen special assessment hardship deferral applies to qualifying special assessments against all properties classified as "homestead" pursuant to Minn. Stat. Chapter 273, where one or more of the owners of such property is 65 years of age or older and it would create a hardship for the owner or owners of the property to pay the special assessment installments as they become due.

(3) The senior citizen shall be required to prove eligibility for this special assessment deferral on the basis of age.

B. Persons Retired by Virtue of Permanent and Total Disability.

(1) The special assessment hardship deferral for persons retired by virtue of permanent and total disability applies to special assessments levied after the date of the adoption of this resolution.

(2) This special assessment hardship deferral applies to qualifying special assessments against all properties classified as "homestead" pursuant to Minn. Stat. Chapter 273 where one or more of the owners of such property is retired by virtue of a permanent and total disability and it would create a hardship for the owner or owners of the property to pay the special assessment installments as they become due.

(3) It shall be presumed that a property owner is retired from employment by virtue of a permanent and total disability if:

(a) The individual has in fact retired from employment; and

(b) The individual suffers from the total and permanent loss of the sight of both eyes, the loss of both arms at the shoulder, the loss of both legs so close to the hips that no effective

artificial members can be used, complete and permanent paralysis, total and permanent loss of mental faculties, or any other injury which totally incapacitates the person from working at an occupation which brings an income.

(4) The owner of the property must provide proof and verify under oath that he qualifies under the criteria defining a permanent and total disability. In cases where exceptional and unusual circumstances exist, the City Council may determine that a permanent and total disability exists despite the fact that the definitional requirements of Section 2,B(3) are not met; such cases shall be decided by the Council on a case by case basis.

C. Hardship.

(1) It shall be presumed that a hardship exists, if:

(a) The annual assessment installment exceeds 1% of the previous year's total adjusted gross incomes, for Federal Income Tax purposes, for all owners of the property; in no event shall "total adjusted gross income" include Social Security Benefits, Railroad Retirement Benefits, retirement benefits attributable to employee contributions, disability benefits, personal injury awards or workers' compensation payments.

(b) All owners of the property verify, under oath, that they meet the criteria for establishing a hardship by completing an application provided by the City or the County.

(2) In cases where exceptional and unusual circumstances exist, the City Council may determine that a hardship exists despite the fact that the minimum income requirements of Sections C (1) are not met; such cases shall be decided by the Council on a case by case basis.

3. Interest: Interest shall be charged on any assessment deferred pursuant to this resolution at a rate equal to the rate charged on other assessments for the particular public improvement project the assessment is financing.

435.193 HARDSHIP ASSESSMENT DEFERRAL FOR SENIORS, DISABLED, OR MILITARY PERSONS.

(a) Notwithstanding the provisions of any law to the contrary, any county, statutory or home rule charter city, or town, making a special assessment may, at its discretion, defer the payment of that assessment for any homestead property:

(1) owned by a person 65 years of age or older or retired by virtue of a permanent and total disability for whom it would be a hardship to make the payments; or

(2) owned by a person who is a member of the Minnesota National Guard or other military reserves who is ordered into active military service, as defined in section 190.05, subdivision 5b or 5c, as stated in the person's military orders, for whom it would be a hardship to make the payments.

(b) Any county, statutory or home rule charter city, or town electing to defer special assessments shall adopt an ordinance or resolution establishing standards and guidelines for determining the existence of a hardship and for determining the existence of a disability, but nothing herein shall be construed to prohibit the determination of hardship on the basis of exceptional and unusual circumstances not covered by the standards and guidelines where the determination is made in a nondiscriminatory manner and does not give the applicant an unreasonable preference or advantage over other applicants.

Background

A neighborhood meeting is scheduled on May 1 at Autumn Grove Park to discuss the proposed projects along Hamline Avenue from County Road C to TH 51/ Snelling. These projects include construction of an 8-foot off-road trail the entire length (partially funded by Ramsey County and Arden Hills), in addition to storm sewer, watermain, and pavement improvements. The storm sewer work is scheduled for this fall and the other improvements in 2026. Preliminary design is underway for the off-road bituminous pathway and the neighborhood meeting seeks to further identify potential impacts and resident concerns.

HAMLIN AVENUE PROJECT

County Road C to Snelling Avenue (2026)

Overview

The City of Roseville, in partnership with Ramsey County and the City of Arden Hills, has combined several construction efforts into one project to make design and construction more efficient, and to limit impacts during construction. The elements of the 2026 Hamline Avenue Project are:

- New pathway on west side of road from County Road C to Josephine Road.
- New pathway on east side of road from Josephine Road to Snelling Avenue in Arden Hills.
- Resurfacing of the roadway from County Road C to Snelling Avenue (TH 51) in Arden Hills.
- New watermain from Josephine Road to Glenhill Road.

Doing the pathways at the same time as the road allows us to narrow the road pavement and lessen the impacts of a new path to trees, yards, and driveways. Doing the watermain at the same time as the road and path projects reduces the amount of time the road may be closed and eliminates the need to pave the road twice. At this time, no permanent easements are anticipated for this work; however, temporary easements may be needed to allow for grading of yards, etc. Schedule information can be found at the bottom of this page.

In addition to the 2026 work, in 2025 Ramsey County will complete a stormwater improvement project on Hamline at Clarmar Lane. The construction timeline and communications about impacts to the traveling public will be available on [Ramsey County's project webpage](#). Although the 2026 projects will coordinate with the 2025 project, the scope of the projects made sense for the drainage project to take place first.

Public Engagement

The first Neighborhood Meeting is scheduled May 1, 2025, at Autumn Grove Park from 6-7:30 p.m. The meeting will not include a formal presentation, so attendees are welcome to come at any time to learn about the projects and share their input. Properties near the project received postcards with additional information.

Funding

The project costs will be funded with a combination of funds from all three agencies – City of Roseville, City of Arden Hills, and Ramsey County. Arden Hills and Roseville’s Municipal State Aid funds (gas tax) and County funds will be used to fund construction of the pathways. Ramsey County will pay for the resurfacing of the roadway and their portion of pathway costs with Wheelage Tax and Regional Sales Tax funds. Watermain improvements will be paid with Arden Hills and Roseville utility funds (utility fees). There will be no assessments to property owners for these improvements.

Schedule

Council Actions are denoted with CC. Public Works, Environment and Transportation Commission items are denoted as PWET. CC and PWET meetings are open to the public and are also available for viewing on the Roseville website or Channel 16 for cable subscribers.

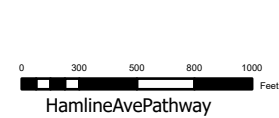
