43 Staff presented the proposed 2026 Capital Improvement Plan (CIP), which is designed to
44 maintain City assets in a consistent and proactive manner. The fund supporting these
45 improvements is primarily financed through tax levy dollars, with planning conducted over a 20-
46 year horizon to ensure long-term upkeep and sustainability of facilities and infrastructure.

123 The Commission discussed the possibility of reallocating funds to avoid limiting the scope of
124 future projects. Members acknowledged the challenge of balancing all needs within the system,
125 ensuring that ideas can be explored without compromising equitable investment across projects.

126

127 Chair Matts-Benson asked whether park buildings would continue to use the same color scheme.
128 Staff confirmed that the existing color theme will remain in place and has now been extended to
129 the amphitheater and the nature center.

130

131 The Commission discussed the concept of a nature-themed playground at HANC and suggested
132 exploring a potential partnership with the school to support and enhance the project. They also
133 talked about the community outreach and email communication that occur throughout CIP
134 projects to keep residents informed and engaged.

135

136 Chair Matts-Benson expressed her appreciation for the thoughtful and deliberate approach staff
137 takes when assessing projects and determining priorities. She thanked staff for their careful
138 planning and for being strong stewards of the City's resources.

139

Chair Matts-Benson added that she values the department’s commitment to keeping programs, events, and facility rentals affordable and accessible to the community, rather than prioritizing maximum profit.

The Commission discussed the reserve minimums and maximums within the operating budget, noting that maintaining healthy reserves is essential given the variable and often unpredictable nature of Parks and Recreation operations. Commissioners also expressed interest in being more involved in providing feedback on future budget development.

c) MAINTENANCE AND OPERATIONS CENTER UPDATE (STANDING AGENDA ITEM)

The City of Roseville has entered into an agreement with LHB Architects to serve as the architect for the License and Passport Center, Dance Studio, and Maintenance Center projects.

The City will utilize Kraus-Anderson as the Construction Manager to oversee project deliverables.

ITEM DESCRIPTION: Consider the Conversion of Central Park Victoria Tennis Courts to Shared Use Pickleball/Tennis Courts

Background

Over the past fifteen years, pickleball has been the fastest-growing sport in the United States. Consequently, pickleball courts have been one of the most frequently requested amenities in the community. In 2016, the tennis courts at Evergreen Park were striped for dual-use (tennis and pickleball). After years of heavy pickleball use and requests from the pickleball community, in 2022 the courts were converted to six full-time pickleball courts.

Since their conversion, the pickleball courts at Evergreen Park have become one of the most used amenities in our parks system, with the courts typically full many mornings and evenings (often beyond capacity).

Staff continues to receive regular requests for additional courts in the central portion of the city.

Noise associated with pickleball play is typically the most significant concern when evaluating new locations. While no national industry standard exists, best practices suggest courts be placed no closer than 200 feet from the nearest home, with some recommending consideration for homes within 400 feet. For example, recently, the City of Maple Grove adopted a policy of 150 or 200 feet for pickleball courts (attached).

The City of Roseville currently has tennis courts at Acorn (2), Autumn Grove (2), Sandcastle (1), Howard Johnson (2), Bruce Russell (1), Rosebrook (2), Keya (2), and Central (2) parks . The City also has a shared-use agreement for the courts at Anpétu Téča Education Center, but they are showing structural issues and will need to be evaluated in the future. National data indicates that tennis also continues to grow, albeit at a much slower rate than pickleball.

As we plan to refurbish the Central Park courts in 2026, they may be a good candidate for the addition of pickleball lines due to their distance from homes (the nearest home is approximately 515 feet from the court edge), and the existing infrastructure on site: ample parking, non-portable restrooms, and court lights. However, staff also notes that the Central Park courts are regularly used for tennis, and any change to the court configuration should consider impacts to tennis users.

Staff will share information with the Commission regarding the pros and cons of adding pickleball lines to the Central Park courts as part of the 2026 refurbishment, including possible public engagement and neighborhood notification strategies.

RECOMMENDED PARK BOARD ACTION:

Motion to adopt a Parks and Recreation Board policy establishing a minimum setback of 150 feet for overlay pickleball courts and 200 feet from residential structures for dedicated pickleball courts.

BACKGROUND:

Pickleball’s rapid growth in Maple Grove—now offering 52 total courts (24 dedicated, 28 striped)—has outpaced the national average.

The Maple Grove pickleball service level of 7.4 per 10,000 residents is among the highest in the region—more than double the service level in comparable cities like Eagan, Woodbury, and Plymouth. This elevated service level reinforces the need for responsible controls to protect against residential disturbance.

Outlined below is a chronological summary of events and Park Board actions concerning pickleball noise:

- Sep 2024: Noise complaint received from Fish Lake Woods resident.
- Oct 17, 2024: Staff presents court proximity data; proposes pilot mitigation efforts.
- Mar 17, 2025: Updated mitigation costs presented; resident reiterates opposition.
- Mar 20, 2025: Board reviews national acoustic data and directs evaluation of mitigation tools.
- Apr 22, 2025: Board votes to remove pickleball lines from Fish Lake Woods Park tennis courts due to proximity to homes.
- May 2025: Pickleball lines are removed. Some residents request reinstatement.

- June 18, 2025: Board discusses possible standards at work session, including setbacks, quiet equipment, and time restrictions.

The Parks and Recreation Board reviewed extensive data, public feedback, national studies, and staff analysis regarding pickleball-related noise near residential areas.

Key Findings:

- National studies consistently recommend setbacks of 150–245 feet.
- Sound from pickleball play reaches 60–70 dBA at 100 feet, significantly louder than ambient residential noise (~40–50 dBA).
- Court orientation, surface material, and barriers offer limited noise reduction compared to distance.

At their June 18, 2025 Park Board work session, the Board directed staff to prepare a policy restricting the location of pickleball courts to no closer than 150 feet from a residential structure for existing overlay pickleball courts and 200 feet for newly constructed courts.

Recommended Policy:

Minimum Setback Standards:

- Overlay pickleball courts require a minimum of 150-foot distance from residential structures.
- Dedicated pickleball courts require a minimum of 200-foot distance from residential structures.

Recommended Practice:

Future Planning and Design:

- Prioritize distance, court orientation, natural buffers, sound abatement measures and strategic placement in future projects.
- Locate new courts for site specific compliance and neighborhood compatibility.

The proposed standard aligns with national best practices and supports neighborhood livability. Maple Grove’s leadership, in addressing this issue, proactively reinforces its commitment to balanced and thoughtful park planning.

NEXT STEPS:

Implementation of the new policy will impact existing courts at these parks: Hemlock Ponds, Fish Lake Woods, Forestview Ponds, Scott Jonquil Meadows, Donahue North and Kerber.

Staff will communicate the new policy to residents within 500 feet of each affected park, informing them of the new policy and when their courts will revert to tennis only. Staff are recommending this letter be mailed this fall and the court conversion happen before winter.

Background

On several occasions, the Commission has discussed the upcoming capital improvements at Rosebrook. Most recently, on January 7, 2025, the commission recommended that staff proceed with a 2026 project that includes:

- Replacing the wading pool with a splash pad
- Replacing the outdated playground,
- Adding trail lighting, and;
- Adding parking near the building.

On February 24, 2025, the City Council approved moving forward with that project and budget. Since that time, staff have held several additional engagement opportunities, including tabling at a Discover Your Parks Event on August 6, and two neighborhood meetings on October 28 and November 12. Neighborhood feedback informed the specific design of the splash pad and playground, and reaffirmed the overall site concept.

With engagement now complete, staff and consultants have arrived at the final design for the renovations to Rosebrook Park.

Staff will share the final design with the Commission and discuss the budget and planned implementation schedule.

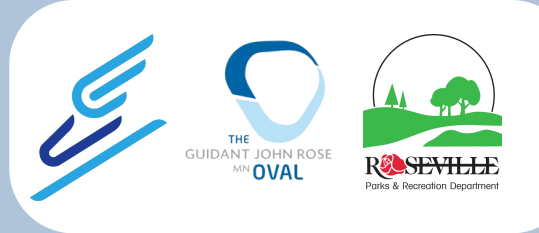
