Item Description: Discuss and Consider Policies and Ordinances Related to Federal Immigration Enforcement

Background

At the January 12, 2026 meeting, the City Council heard extensive testimony from the community regarding the federal government's surge in immigration enforcement. After the testimony, the City Council directed staff to bring back information about policy options, including amended or new city policies or ordinances for the City Council to consider.

Specifically, the Council directed staff to bring back information related to the following items:

1. Consider amendments to or creation of new policies and/or ordinances to limit, as much as possible, DHS, ICE and associated agencies' use of city property, staff and data (Councilmember Bauer)
2. No use of any Roseville resources for support of ICE, to include transport, cameras, city data, funds, real-time data requests, or information about immigration status. No city staff, including Roseville Police, are allowed to participate in civil immigration enforcement. (Councilmember Strahan)
3. All interactions between city staff and DHS/ICE must be documented, publicly disclosed, and are subject to City Council oversight. (Councilmember Strahan)
4. City Council directs the City Manager to train city employees, utilizing written protocols, on how to respond to ICE, including when they are to refer a situation to legal counsel. (Councilmember Strahan)
5. On city website, publish guidelines for residents on what orders they must obey and what their legal rights are, and how they may utilize RPD to safeguard their freedoms when infringed upon. (Councilmember Strahan)
6. City will prohibit agents from any agency from conducting activities in the city of Roseville while masked or without providing identifying information. (Councilmember Strahan)
7. Right of citizens to peacefully protest will be preserved, without interference by Roseville staff or police. (Councilmember Strahan)
8. Signage on Roseville city property, including parks, the city campus, or city-owned buildings, to bar ICE from staging or engaging in detention activities. (Councilmember Strahan)
9. Providing signage at minimal cost to interested private businesses within Roseville to ban ICE on their private properties. (Councilmember Strahan)
10. Charge and prosecute any individuals, ICE or otherwise, who break windows, break into vehicles, assault civilians, pull fire alarms, or cause other destruction of property or to persons, to the full extent of the law. (Councilmember Strahan)
11. Issue an executive directive prohibiting city employees and law enforcement from assisting ICE in civil immigration enforcement absent a judicial warrant, and banning participation in joint task forces or cooperative arrangements related to civil immigration enforcement (Citizen Petition)

12. Prohibit masked or unidentified law enforcement activity within city limits, requiring visible name and agency identification for any enforcement action, and mandating disengagement where this standard is violated (Citizen Petition)
13. Bar the use of city-owned property, facilities, vehicles, and resources for ICE operations, including terminating or refusing leases and access agreements (Citizen Petition)
14. Cancel city contracts and funding streams that support immigration detention, transport, or surveillance, and deny permits for new or expanded detention facilities (Citizen Petition)
15. Enact strict city data-privacy rules barring the sharing or purchase of warrantless location, biometric, or surveillance data, and prohibiting data broker access. (Citizen Petition)
16. Direct the City Attorney and relevant departments to investigate ICE-related misconduct and enforce all applicable municipal laws, including nuisance, trespass, and public safety violations (Citizen Petition)
17. Convene public oversight hearings to create a full public record of ICE activity and city involvement (Citizen Petition)

Discussion

Below is a discussion of each item and potential policy/ordinance considerations for the City Council to consider:

Consider amendments to or creation of new policies and/or ordinances to limit as much as possible DHS, ICE and associated agencies use of city property, staff and data (Councilmember Bauer)

No use of any Roseville resources for support of ICE, to include transport, cameras, city data, funds, real time data requests, or information about immigration status. No city staff, including Roseville Police, are allowed to participate in civil immigration enforcement. (Councilmember Strahan)

Since 2017, the City has had in place Roseville Police Department (RPD) Policy 413 regarding immigration enforcement. The policy states that the Roseville Police Department does not undertake immigration enforcement and will at no time ask for a person's immigration status unless it is part of a criminal investigation. In addition, in 2017, the City Council passed resolution #14434 that dictated that this policy cannot be changed unless with City Council approval.

Staff has reviewed the existing policy and have suggested changes to the policy to better strengthen and clarify the Roseville Police Department's policy regarding immigration enforcement.

Presently, there are no other policies or ordinances that govern the use of external agencies regarding the use of city property, staff, and data. For the City Council's consideration, staff has drafted a proposed resolution and "Use of City Resources" ordinance to address those items (Attachments 3-5). The resolution and ordinance should be considered together as the resolution provides background on the need for the ordinance. The resolution affirms the lawful and appropriate use of city resources.

Specifically, the draft language in the ordinance would:

- Clarify the use of city personnel and resources related to the enforcement of federal immigration laws
- State that no federal, state, or local government entity is authorized to be on any city-owned parking lot as staging area, operations base in enforcing federal immigration law without permission
- Require reporting by any city employee who has an interaction with a representative of the Department of Homeland Security

All interactions between city staff and DHS/ICE must be documented, publicly disclosed, and are subject to City Council oversight. (Councilmember Strahan)

As part of the proposed ordinance, staff will be required to document information about that interaction. This information will be shared with the City Council and the public on a regular and as-needed basis.

91
92 **City Council directs the City Manager to train city employees, utilizing written protocols, on how**
93 **to respond to ICE, including when they are referring a situation to legal counsel. (Councilmember**
94 **Strahan)**

95 Staff has put together written information and training for city employees on how to respond to
96 immigration enforcement officials when interacting with them, including elevating such interaction to a
97 supervisor and/or city attorney as necessary. Training was conducted on January 16 with over 40
98 employees attending.

99
100 **On city website, publish guidelines for residents on what orders they must obey and what their**
101 **legal rights are, and how they may utilize RPD to safeguard their freedoms when infringed upon.**
102 **(Councilmember Strahan)**

103 Staff has posted information on the city website (www.cityofroseville.com) about immigration resources,
104 including a “Know Your Rights” section, the role of the Roseville Police Department and information
105 about the City’s policies related to immigration enforcement. As the current situation is dynamic, City
106 staff will update the website as the situation warrants.

107
108 **City will prohibit agents from any agency from conducting activities in the city of Roseville while**
109 **masked or without providing identifying information. (Councilmember Strahan)**

110 Roseville Police Department officers are required to display their name (first initial and last name) and
111 badge as part of their uniform requirements in RPD Policy 1017 (Attachment 6). The uniform policy also
112 does not allow for facial coverings to be worn by officers during performance of their duties if it is
113 intended to conceal the officer’s identity. There are exceptions under the policy for such things as cold
114 weather, wearing personal protective equipment for health and safety reasons, and for tactical and other
115 reasons as determined by the Chief of Police. During protests, demonstrations, and other first
116 amendment assemblies, Policy 425 regarding First Amendment Assemblies (Attachment 7) requires that
117 officers at such events wear a uniform displaying department name and a unique personal identifier.

118
119 Prohibiting external agencies from conducting activities in Roseville while masked or without providing
120 identification is challenging due to law and jurisdictional considerations and enforceability. As a local
121 governmental unit, Roseville would have no authority or jurisdiction over the federal government and its
122 departments and agencies. Currently, a law passed in California that prohibited the use of masks and
123 operating without identification is being appealed in the courts and the State of California has paused
124 enforcing that law.

125
126 Beyond the legal uncertainty about banning the use of masks and operating without identification, there
127 are practical difficulties in enforcement by the City. Having Roseville’s police officers enforcing these
128 requirements will put them in a difficult and impossible position to enforce. It is not practical, especially
129 in the current climate, to think that our, or any local law enforcement agency, will be able to enforce an
130 ordinance that prohibits external agencies from wearing masks and not identifying themselves while
131 conducting immigration enforcement.

132
133 At this point, staff does not recommend pursuing an ordinance to prohibit external agencies from
134 conducting activities in Roseville while masked or without identification due to the legal uncertainty of
135 such laws and ordinances and the practical difficulties for local governments enforcing such an
136 ordinance.

137
138 **Right of citizens to peacefully protest will be preserved, without interference by Roseville staff or**
139 **police. (Councilmember Strahan)**

140 The City of Roseville Police Department has Policy 425 First Amendment Assemblies (Attachment 7) in
141 place that provides guidance for responding to public assemblies or demonstrations. This policy states
142 that the Police Department will not unreasonably interfere with, harass, intimidate or discriminate against
143 people engaged in the lawful exercise of their rights, while also preserving peace, protecting life and
144 preventing the destruction of property. Staff has updated its policy to strengthen the language on
145 protecting constitutional rights of people to peaceably assemble.

146

147 **Signage on Roseville city property, including parks, the city campus, or city owned buildings, to**
148 **bar ICE from staging or engaging in detention activities. (Councilmember Strahan)**

149 On January 15, staff posted signage on city property to reflect the existing City practice and long-
150 standing expectations for how parking lots at parks and City facilities are intended to be used
151 (Attachment 8). These parking areas are designed to support individuals actively using City amenities,
152 programs, and facilities. The language of the signs are as follows:

153
154 *“Parking for Facility (Park) Users Only. Parking lot use is limited to active facility use while on premises.*
155 *Staging, storage, or other activities are not permitted without a permit.”*

156
157 The enforcement of this practice will be impracticable as it relates to external agencies conducting
158 immigration enforcement, namely due to the disparity in the number of personnel deployed by federal
159 law enforcement agencies as well as federal authority over local units of government. As a result, the
160 Roseville Police Department will not respond to calls from the public regarding use of city property for
161 staging or other uses related to immigration enforcement. Instead, we ask that when the public observe
162 a federal agency presence in one of the City’s parking lots, to email complaint@cityofroseville.com with
163 any information on what they saw. The City will document any activity in our parking lots for any potential
164 action by the city or other level of government in the future.

165
166 **Providing signage at minimal cost to interested private businesses within Roseville to ban ICE**
167 **on their private properties. (Councilmember Strahan)**

168 Existing templates are available to download for free from numerous websites. An example is below
169 (Attachment 9):

173 However, based on City Council direction, staff can provide signage templates to interested private
174 businesses that wish to ban immigration enforcement officials from their property

175
176 **Charge and prosecute any individuals, ICE or otherwise, who break windows, break into**
177 **vehicles, assault civilians, pull fire alarms, or cause other destruction of property or to persons,**
178 **to the full extent of the law. (Councilmember Strahan)**

179 As has been observed to date, the external agencies conducting immigration enforcement have not
180 been cooperative with local officials. As a result, it may prove difficult for the City to pursue charges
181 against external agencies. The public should call 911 when they see a public safety incident. When an
182 incident is reported, public safety will respond as appropriate and gather available information and
183 evidence. If the facts indicate that a violation of law has occurred, the matter will be referred to the
184 prosecuting attorney for potential filing of charges.

185
186 It should be noted that Ramsey County Attorney John Choi is working on creating a process for
187 coordinating the sharing of information between law enforcement agencies and his office incidents
188 where federal law enforcement officers use deadly force. In addition, the Minnesota Attorney General
189 has created an online portal for the public to report on the actions of federal law enforcement agencies
190 at: https://www.ag.state.mn.us/Office/Communications/2026/01/15_FederalAction.asp

191
192 **Issue an executive directive prohibiting city employees and law enforcement from assisting ICE**
193 **in civil immigration enforcement absent a judicial warrant, and banning participation in joint task**
194 **forces or cooperative arrangements related to civil immigration enforcement (Citizen Petition)**

195 The City is a Statutory Plan B city under state law and does not have the authority to issue an executive
196 directive or order. RPD Policy 413 does not allow the Roseville Police Department to participate in joint
197 task forces related to federal immigration enforcement.

198
199 **Prohibit masked or unidentified law enforcement activity within city limits, requiring visible name**
200 **and agency identification for any enforcement action, and mandating disengagement where this**
201 **standard is violated (Citizen Petition)**

202 This is addressed earlier in the report.

203
204 **Bar the use of city-owned property, facilities, vehicles, and resources for ICE operations,**
205 **including terminating or refusing leases and access agreements (Citizen Petition)**
206 This is addressed earlier in the report.
207
208 **Cancel city contracts and funding streams that support immigration detention, transport, or**
209 **surveillance, and deny permits for new or expanded detention facilities (Citizen Petition)**
210 The City of Roseville does not own, operate, or contract for detention facilities that support immigration
211 detention, support, or surveillance. The Roseville Zoning Code does not allow for detention centers to
212 be in the City of Roseville.
213
214 **Enact strict city data-privacy rules barring the sharing or purchase of warrantless location,**
215 **biometric, or surveillance data, and prohibiting data broker access. (Citizen Petition)**
216 The draft "Use of City Resources" ordinance addresses these concerns and ensures that any
217 information the City has pertaining to a person's citizenship status is not shared or able to be
218 accessed/purchased by third parties unless required by the Minnesota and federal data practices
219 laws. Regarding the license plate readers, RPD Policy 420 Automated License Plate Reader (ALPR)
220 [Attachment 10] has been strengthened to explicitly state that ALPR data cannot be used or shared for
221 immigration matters or with ICE.
222
223 **Direct the City Attorney and relevant departments to investigate ICE-related misconduct and**
224 **enforce all applicable municipal laws, including nuisance, trespass, and public safety violations**
225 **(Citizen Petition)**
226 This is addressed earlier in the report.
227
228 **Convene public oversight hearings to create a full public record of ICE activity and city**
229 **involvement (Citizen Petition)**
230 The City does not have jurisdiction for oversight of state or federal government and therefore is not able
231 undertake such action
232
233 **Other Policy Considerations**
234 **City Statement on recent immigration enforcement activities**
235 The City Council may want to draft and release a statement from the City Council. Based on City
236 Council direction, the Mayor and City Manager can draft a statement for release.
237
238 **Cities of St. Paul, Minneapolis, and State of Minnesota Lawsuit against the Federal Government to**
239 **challenge the ongoing Operation Metro Surge immigration enforcement actions.**
240 On January 12, 2026, the State of Minnesota and Cities of St. Paul and Minneapolis filed a lawsuit
241 against the federal government. The lawsuit includes the entire state of Minnesota, so all cities are
242 covered by the lawsuit. The City Attorney and her firm are reviewing what needs to be done to join the
243 lawsuit if that is the desire of the City Council.
244
245 **Federal retaliatory actions against the State of Minnesota**
246 President Trump has announced plans to cut funding to sanctuary cities starting Feb. 1, 2026. The
247 White House has classified Minnesota as a Sanctuary State. At this point, it is unclear what type of
248 funding would potentially be cut and what, if any, impact the federal funding cuts would have for
249 Minnesota cities. (Minneapolis and St. Paul have been identified as sanctuary cities and would most
250 likely be impacted by federal cuts).
251
252 As the Council is aware, the City was recently awarded nearly \$4.5 million in federal grants for our fire
253 and police departments. We have also received federal grant funds for our embedded social
254 workers. There are also state grants that we have received whose funding source are federal funds.
255
256 The reality of losing such federal funds due to action by the City is unknown. Any policy choices by the
257 City should be carefully weighed with the possibility of losing federal funds.
258

259 **Policy Objectives**

260 In consideration of actions regarding federal immigration enforcement, applicable laws and roles of the
261 federal government should be acknowledged and the City's values (Accountability, Integrity, Equity,
262 Community and Safety) should be factored into any discussion and decision made by the City Council.
263

264 **Equity Impact Summary**

265 The discussion and consideration of Policies and Ordinances relating to Federal Immigration
266 Enforcement should be centered on the City's values, *accountability, integrity, equity, community and*
267 *safety*. At the City Council meeting on January 12, 2026, city staff and city council received public
268 testimony from the Roseville community in support of the city taking steps to restrict immigration
269 enforcement efforts within the city. Many of these requests increase accountability, encourage integrity,
270 advance equity, support the community and increase safety. As a result of the public testimony, the city
271 has strengthened policies and ordinances and created a "use of resources" ordinance for consideration
272 by city council.
273

274 The use of resources ordinance defines the City's protocol related to federal immigration enforcement.
275 With the ordinance, the city increases its ability to be accountable to the community when federal
276 immigration efforts are taking place in the City of Roseville. Additionally, the city is prioritizing the safety
277 of staff and community by limiting the use of city resources in federal immigration efforts. The equity
278 value is about understanding that different members of our communities may need different supports. In
279 this moment, when Roseville immigrant communities are being targeted, the use of resources ordinance
280 clarifies that the City, and its employees, will not inquire about the immigration status of a resident
281 unless required to do so by law. The use of resource ordinance is responsive to the community request
282 heard at the January 12, 2026 city council meeting to strengthen and enhance city policy and ordinance
283 to limit federal immigration enforcement efforts in the city.
284

285 **Budget Implications**

286 Beyond staff time and minimal expenditure of funds, it is not expected the action discussed will lead to a
287 significant direct cost to the City. As mentioned, actions by the Federal Government toward cities that
288 take action regarding immigration enforcement is unknown. As the City has received federal funds to
289 assist in the funding of public safety services, the future of those funds may be in jeopardy dependent on
290 a future Federal Government action.
291

292 **Staff Recommendations**

293 Staff recommends the City Council consider adopting the Use of City Resource Ordinance by adopting
294 the ordinance, resolution of ordinance summary, and the resolution affirming the lawful and appropriate
295 use of city resources.
296

297 Staff recommends approving the updated Policy Department Policy 413 regarding immigration matters.
298

299 Staff asks the City Council to review and discuss the material in this City Council Request for Action and
300 provide direction to staff on any next steps the City should take.
301

302 **Requested Council Action**

303 If there is a desire to pass the "Use of City Resources" ordinance, a motion should be made to approve
304 the ordinance, resolution of ordinance summary, and the resolution affirming the lawful and appropriate
305 use of city resources.
306

307 If there is a desire to approve the updated Police Department Policy 413 (Immigration Matters), a motion
308 should be made to approve the updated Police Department Policy included as Attachment 2.
309

310 The City Council should also review and discuss the material in this City Council Request for Action and
311 provide direction to staff on the items presented.

A RESOLUTION ADOPTING POLICE DEPARTMENT POLICY #102 REGARDING IMMIGRATION ENFORCEMENT

BE IT RESOLVED that the Roseville City Council hereby adopts as city policy the Police Department policy #102 as it pertains to immigration enforcement presented by the City Manager this evening, and amended by the City Council, as follows:

Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE)

Federal law does not authorize the Roseville Police Department to enforce federal immigration laws. As such, employees shall not inquire about a person's immigration status unless it is directly related to a criminal investigation.

Members of the department are authorized to assist ICE when it is related to scene safety and/or the safety of ICE employees as they perform their duties. Members of the department are authorized to cooperate with a task force involving ICE agents as long as the focus of the task force is not immigration enforcement.

Member of the department will cooperate with ICE as specifically mandated by federal and state laws.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED that any change to Police Department policy #102 as it pertains to immigration enforcement must be approved by City Council.

Re: Suggested updates to Immigration Policy

Background

On August 28, 2017, the Roseville City Council passed [Resolution 11435](#) which directed that specific language be incorporated into the Police Department policy governing immigration enforcement and further required that language changes must be approved by the City Council. This directive has been carried forward in our current policy manual under Policy 413.6 (formerly Policy 102).

The specific language adopted by the City Council in Resolution 11435 and in current policy is as follows:

Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE)

Federal law does not authorize the Roseville Police Department to enforce federal immigration laws. As such, employees shall not inquire about a person's immigration status unless it is directly related to a criminal investigation.

Members of the department are authorized to assist ICE when it is related to scene safety and/or the safety of ICE employees as they perform their duties. Members of the department are authorized to cooperate with a task force involving ICE agents as long as the focus of the task force is not immigration enforcement.

Members of the department will cooperate with ICE as specifically mandated by federal and state laws.

Consideration of Policy Update

Following recent immigration enforcement activity in Minnesota, as well as concerns brought forward by members of our community, the Roseville Police Department conducted a review of several policies, including Policy 413. While most updates did not change how the Roseville Police Department handles immigration-related matters, language was revised to provide additional clarity to both officers and the community regarding how the Department responds to calls involving immigration matters.

The section governed by Resolution 11435 (Section 413.6 Federal Requests for Assistance) was reviewed in consultation with the City Attorney, with consideration of community feedback and current best practices. The following language was drafted for Policy 413.6 and is proposed for Council approval:

Members shall not participate in immigration enforcement. As such, employees shall not inquire about a person's immigration status unless it is directly related to a criminal investigation.

Members of the department are authorized to assist federal immigration officers when it is related to scene safety and/or the safety of federal immigration employees as they perform their duties. Members of the department are authorized to cooperate with a task force involving federal agents as long as the focus of the task force is not immigration enforcement. If a situation arises where federal agents, including immigration officers, are being assaulted, or there is a clear threat to life, injury, or destruction of property, members are expected to take appropriate action to maintain public safety and restore and maintain order. This response is not an endorsement of immigration enforcement, but a duty to uphold peace and protect all people from harm.

Members of the department will cooperate with ICE as specifically mandated by federal and state laws.

Requests by federal immigration officials for assistance from this department should be directed to a supervisor. When possible and feasible, a supervisor should respond to calls involving immigration enforcement.

Action Requested

We request that the City Council review and approve the updated language for Section 413.6 as required by the former resolution. We believe this revision provides clearer guidance regarding the Department's response to federal requests for assistance in immigration matters while remaining consistent with Council direction, community expectations, and legal requirements. The addition of language encouraging supervisor response, when possible, further supports transparency and appropriate oversight.

Immigration Matters

413.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The purpose of this policy is to provide guidelines to members of the Roseville Police Department when investigating crimes where a suspect is in violation of federal immigration laws or when interacting with federal immigration officials.

413.2 POLICY

It is the policy of the Roseville Police Department that all members make personal and professional commitments to equal enforcement of the law and equal service to the public. Confidence in this commitment will increase the effectiveness of this department in protecting and serving the entire community and recognizing the dignity of all persons, regardless of their national origin or immigration status.

The Roseville Police Department does not investigate federal immigration violations. The Roseville Police Department defers immigration enforcement responsibilities to federal immigration officers authorized to enforce both civil and criminal immigration violations.

It is the policy of the Roseville Police Department that all persons are equally entitled to protection and that all persons should be able to access police services without regard to their immigration status.

413.3 VICTIMS AND WITNESSES

The Roseville Police Department is a victim-centered organization. Individuals, regardless of their immigration status, must feel secure in contacting members of law enforcement. While it may be necessary to determine the identity of a victim or witness, members shall treat all individuals equally and shall not inquire into the immigration or citizenship status of an individual, except where the inquiry relates to a legitimate law enforcement purpose that is unrelated to the enforcement of federal immigration law.

413.4 DETENTIONS

An officer should not question, arrest or detain any individual, for any length of time, for a civil violation of federal immigration laws or a related civil warrant. Roseville Police Officers may not undertake any law enforcement action for the sole purpose of detecting the presence of undocumented persons, or to verify immigration status, including but not limited to questioning any person or persons about their immigration status.

413.5 ARREST NOTIFICATION TO IMMIGRATION AND CUSTOMS ENFORCEMENT

Generally, an officer should not notify federal immigration officials when booking arrestees at a county jail facility. Any required notification will be handled according to jail operation procedures. No individual who is otherwise ready to be released should continue to be detained solely for the purpose of notification.

Immigration Matters

413.6 FEDERAL REQUESTS FOR ASSISTANCE

Federal law does not authorize the Roseville Police Department to enforce federal immigration laws. As such, employees shall not inquire about a person's immigration status unless it is directly related to a criminal investigation.

Members of the department are authorized to assist ICE when it is related to scene safety and/or the safety of ICE employees as they perform their duties. Members of the department are authorized to cooperate with a task force involving ICE agents as long as the focus of the task force is not immigration enforcement.

Member of the department will cooperate with ICE as specifically mandated by federal and state laws.¹

Requests by federal immigration officials for assistance from this department should be directed to a supervisor.

Immigration Matters

413.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The purpose of this policy is to provide guidelines to members of the Roseville Police Department when investigating crimes where a suspect is in violation of federal immigration laws or when interacting with federal immigration officials.

413.2 POLICY

It is the policy of the Roseville Police Department that all members make personal and professional commitments to equal enforcement of the law and equal service to the public. Confidence in this commitment will increase the effectiveness of this department in protecting and serving the entire community and recognizing the dignity of all persons, regardless of their national origin or immigration status.

The Roseville Police Department does not investigate federal immigration violations. The Roseville Police Department defers immigration enforcement responsibilities to federal immigration officers authorized to enforce both civil and criminal immigration violations.

It is the policy of the Roseville Police Department that all persons are equally entitled to protection and that all persons should be able to access police services without regard to their immigration status.

413.3 VICTIMS AND WITNESSES

The Roseville Police Department is a victim-centered organization. Individuals, regardless of their immigration status, must feel secure in contacting members of law enforcement. While it may be necessary to determine the identity of a victim or witness, members shall treat all individuals equally and shall not inquire into the immigration or citizenship status of an individual, except where the inquiry relates to a legitimate law enforcement purpose that is unrelated to the enforcement of federal immigration law.

If immigration status is uncovered inadvertently and is not relevant or an element of a crime such as human trafficking, smuggling, or a situation where the victim was targeted, threatened or harassed because of their perceived immigration status, members are not required to include the person's immigration status in reports or similar documentation.

413.4 DETENTIONS

An officer should not question, or take any law enforcement action for the purpose of enforcing a civil violation of federal immigration laws or a related civil warrant or any federal criminal immigration law that penalizes a person's presence in, entry, or reentry to, or employment in, the United States, when not accompanied by other criminal conduct. Roseville Police Officers may not undertake any law enforcement action for the sole purpose of detecting the presence of undocumented persons, or to verify immigration status, including but not limited to questioning any person or persons about their immigration status.

Immigration Matters

413.5 ARREST NOTIFICATION TO IMMIGRATION AND CUSTOMS ENFORCEMENT

Members shall not initiate actions to determine, verify, or detect a person's immigration status, unless immigration status is an element or relevant to a crime, or otherwise in conjunction with a criminal investigation of an individual who may also be in violation of federal immigration law. An officer should not notify federal immigration officials when booking arrestees at a county jail facility. Any required notification will be handled according to jail operation procedures.

413.6 FEDERAL REQUESTS FOR ASSISTANCE

Members shall not participate in immigration enforcement. As such, employees shall not inquire about a person's immigration status unless it is directly related to a criminal investigation.

Members of the department are authorized to assist federal immigration officers when it is related to scene safety and/or the safety of federal immigration employees as they perform their duties. Members of the department are authorized to cooperate with a task force involving federal agents as long as the focus of the task force is not immigration enforcement. If a situation arises where federal agents, including immigration officers, are being assaulted, or there is a clear threat to life, injury, or destruction of property, members are expected to take appropriate action to maintain public safety and restore and maintain order. This response is not an endorsement of immigration enforcement, but a duty to uphold peace and protect all people from harm.

Members of the department will cooperate with ICE as specifically mandated by federal and state laws.¹

Requests by federal immigration officials for assistance from this department should be directed to a supervisor. When possible and feasible, a supervisor should respond to calls involving immigration enforcement.

**AN ORDINANCE AMENDING TITLE I TO ESTABLISH
SECTION 112 ENTITLED "USE OF CITY RESOURCES."**

THE CITY OF ROSEVILLE ORDAINS:

SECTION 1: Title I, Section 112 of the Roseville City Code is hereby created to read as follows:

1120.01. General city services. To the extent permitted by law, in determining eligibility for, and providing general city services, city employees shall be governed by the following requirements:

- (a) Other than when required by law, city employees, representatives, and contractors shall not use city resources, city facilities, property, moneys, equipment, data, technology (e.g. license plate recognition, surveillance video, computers) ("city resources") or city personnel for the purpose of enforcing federal immigration laws. Data subject to 8 U.S.C. §§ 1373 and 1644 are exempt from this provision.
- (b) No city officer or employee should inquire into the immigration status of any person or request any documents or information verifying the immigration status of any individual, unless required to do so by law. City employees are to carry out their regular duties for the purpose of administering general city services and programs. Employees may complete 1-9 forms, may question a person regarding the 1-9 form and documents supporting the 1-9 form, and may a comply with demands by the federal government to audit the 1-9 forms as allowed by law.
- (c) City employees shall follow general city, state and federal guidelines to assess eligibility for services. City employees shall only solicit immigration information or inquire about immigration status when specifically required to do so by law or program guidelines. Information about immigration status in the possession of the city shall not be maintained or recorded except as otherwise specifically required by law. Such information shall be protected and disclosed as required by Minnesota Government Data Practices Act.

112.02. Access to property, signage.

- (a) City-owned or city-controlled parking lots, vacant lots, and garages are not open to the general public without restrictions. No individual, including a

40 federal, state, or local government entity, is authorized to use any city-
 41 owned or city-controlled parking lot, vacant lot, or garage as a staging area,
 42 processing location, operations base, or any other similar use including for
 43 enforcing federal immigration laws, without the consent of the city.

55 **112.03. Departmental reporting.** Any city employee who has an interaction with

59 **112.04. Compliance with federal law.** Nothing in this chapter shall be construed to
 60 violate federal law. The City and its departments and employees will comply with federal
 61 law including 8 U.S.C. §§ 1373 & 1644.

62 **112.05. Subpoena or other legal obligation.** Nothing in this chapter prohibits city
 63 employees from responding to a properly issued judicial subpoena, other compulsory legal
 64 process, or a data request when and to the extent that a response is required by law.

 66 SECTION 2: Incorporation. City staff is authorized and directed to update the table
 67 of contents, reformat this ordinance, and to make such other non-substantive
 68 changes, including correcting scrivener's errors, as are necessary to incorporate the
 69 amendments adopted by this ordinance into the Roseville City Code.

Uniform Regulations

1017.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The uniform policy of the Roseville Police Department is established to ensure that uniformed officers, special assignment personnel and non-licensed employees will be readily identifiable to the public through the proper use and wearing of department uniforms. Employees should also refer to the following associated policies:

- Firearms
- Department Owned and Personal Property
- Body Armor
- Personal Appearance Standards

The Roseville Police Department will provide uniforms for all employees who are required to wear them in the manner, quantity and frequency agreed upon in the respective employee group's collective bargaining agreement. The uniforms for officers of this department shall be a consistent color pursuant to Minn. Stat. § 626.88 Subd. 2.

1017.2 WEARING AND CONDITION OF UNIFORM AND EQUIPMENT

Police employees wear the uniform to be identified as the law enforcement authority in society. The uniform also serves an equally important purpose, which is to identify the wearer as a source of assistance in an emergency, crisis or other time of need.

- (a) All uniforms and uniform alternatives must be approved prior to wearing in an official capacity.
- (b) Uniform and equipment shall be maintained in a serviceable condition and shall be ready at all times for immediate use. Uniforms shall be neat, clean and appear professionally pressed.
- (c) All peace officers of this department shall possess and maintain at all times, a serviceable uniform and the necessary equipment to perform uniformed field duty.
- (d) Personnel shall wear only the uniform specified for their rank and assignment.
- (e) The uniform is to be worn in compliance with the specifications set forth in the Department's uniform specifications and procedures which are maintained separately from this policy.
- (f) All supervisors will perform periodic inspections of their personnel to ensure conformance to these regulations.
- (g) Civilian attire shall not be worn in combination with any distinguishable part of the uniform.
- (h) Uniforms are only to be worn while on-duty, while in transit to or from work, for court or at other official Department functions or events.

Uniform Regulations

- (i) If the uniform is worn while in transit while driving a personal vehicle an outer garment should be worn over the uniform shirt so as not to bring attention to the employee while off-duty.
- (j) Employees are not to purchase or drink alcoholic beverages while wearing any identifiable part of the Department uniform.

1017.3 UNIFORM CLASSES

1017.3.1 CLASS A UNIFORM

The Class A uniform is to be worn on special occasions such as funerals, graduations, promotions, ceremonies or as directed. The Class A uniform is required for all licensed personnel. The Class A uniform includes the standard issue uniform with:

- (a) Long sleeve shirt with tie
- (b) Polished shoes

1017.3.2 CLASS B UNIFORM

All officers will possess and maintain a serviceable Class B uniform at all times.

The Class B uniform will consist of the same garments and equipment as the Class A uniform with the following exceptions:

- (a) The long or short sleeve shirt may be worn.
- (b) Uniform pants with or without cargo pockets.
- (c) Approved all black shoes or boots may be worn.

1017.3.3 SPECIALIZED UNIT UNIFORMS

The Chief of Police may authorize special uniforms to be worn by officers in specialized units such as Canine Team, SWAT, School Liaison, Community Action Team and other specialized assignments. Sworn personnel on plainclothes assignment shall wear business attire as determined by the Chief of Police. Casual attire may be worn for planned details (e.g. search warrant, surveillance, or special details).

1017.3.4 RELIGIOUS HEAD COVERINGS FOR SWORN OFFICERS

Scarves and head covers required for religious believes are allowed with the Chief of Police's approval. The head covering or hijab should match the color of the uniform. Such covering must be neat and presentable and not otherwise prevent the employee from fulfilling all of the normal assigned duties. If the situation requires, officers must be able to wear an issued helmet or mask. For safety reasons, the head covering should be easily removable or "break away" for quick release.

1017.4 INSIGNIA AND PATCHES

- (a) Shoulder patches - The authorized shoulder patch supplied by the Department shall be attached to the sleeves of all uniform shirts and jackets.

Uniform Regulations

- (b) Service stripes and stars - Service stripes and other indicators for length of service may be worn on long sleeved shirts and jackets. They are to be machine stitched onto the uniform. The stripes are to be worn on the left sleeve only.
- (c) The regulation nameplate, or an authorized sewn-on cloth nameplate, shall be worn at all times while in uniform. The nameplate shall display the employee's first initial and last name. If the employee desires other than the legal first name, the employee must receive approval from the Chief of Police.
- (d) When a jacket is worn, the nameplate or an authorized sewn on cloth nameplate shall be affixed to the jacket in the same manner as the uniform.
- (e) Assignment Insignias - Assignment insignias, (e.g., SWAT, FTO or similar) may be worn as designated by the Chief of Police.
- (f) Badge - The Department-issued badge, or an authorized sewn-on cloth replica, must be worn and be visible at all times while in uniform. Licensed non-uniform personnel will wear or carry their badge in a manner that it is in reasonable proximity to their firearm and able to be displayed whenever appropriate.
- (g) Rank insignia - The designated insignia indicating the employee's rank must be worn at all times while in uniform. The Chief of Police may authorize exceptions.
- (h) Officers with past military service are authorized to wear their insignia.

1017.4.1 MOURNING BADGE

Uniformed employees may wear a black mourning band across the uniform badge whenever a law enforcement officer is killed in the line of duty. The following mourning periods will be observed:

- (a) An officer of this department - From the time of death until midnight on the 14th day after the death.
- (b) An officer from this state - From the time of death until midnight on the day of the funeral.
- (c) Funeral attendee - While attending the funeral of a fallen officer.
- (d) National Peace Officers Memorial Day (May 15) - From midnight through the following midnight.
- (e) As directed by the Chief of Police or designee.

1017.5 POLITICAL ACTIVITIES, ENDORSEMENTS, ADVERTISEMENTS OR OTHER APPEARANCES IN UNIFORM

Unless specifically authorized by the Chief of Police, Roseville Police Department employees may not wear any part of the uniform, be photographed wearing any part of the uniform, utilize a badge, patch or other official insignia of the Department, or cause to be posted, published or displayed, the image of another employee, or identify him/herself as an employee of the Roseville Police Department to do any of the following:

- (a) Endorse, support, oppose or contradict any political campaign or initiative.
- (b) Endorse, support, oppose or contradict any social issue, cause or religion.

Uniform Regulations

- (c) Endorse, support or oppose, any product, service, company or other commercial entity.
- (d) Appear in any commercial, social or nonprofit publication, or any motion picture, film, video, public broadcast, photo, any website or any other visual depiction.

1017.6 DAMAGED UNIFORMS AND PERSONAL PROPERTY

Employees are required to keep their uniforms and equipment serviceable and presentable. Routine maintenance of leather gear and footwear is the responsibility of the individual employee. The city will pay for repair of duty-related damage to personal clothing or gear when verified by a supervisor, and the damage is not caused by negligence or normal wear and tear. Uniforms and personal property contaminated by bodily fluids will be cleaned by the department at an approved location. Items will be placed in biohazard bags before cleaning.

Officers may apply for replacement or repair of personal, essential, and job-related items, such as eye glasses, contact lenses, and wrist watches, if damaged on-duty. Officers must submit a repair/replacement bill to their supervisor for approval and submission to the Operations Commander.

1017.7 FACIAL COVERINGS

In order to ensure officers remain readily identifiable to the public and promote transparency and accountability, it is the policy of the Roseville Police Department that facial coverings shall not be worn by officers in the performance of their duties when the covering is intended to hide or conceal the officer's identity. Facial coverings are permitted only in the following circumstances.

- (a) Active undercover operations or assignments
- (b) Tactical operations where protective gear is necessary for officer safety
- (c) Use of personal protective equipment consistent with applicable occupational health and safety standards, including N95 masks, respiratory protection, or self-contained breathing apparatus
- (d) When inclement weather conditions require temporary protection from the elements
- (e) Department-issued safety equipment such as helmets or other required PPE
- (f) Use authorized as a reasonable accommodation under applicable law
- (g) Situations or operations approved by the Chief of Police

First Amendment Assemblies

425.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

This policy provides guidance for responding to public assemblies or demonstrations.

425.2 POLICY

It is the policy of the Roseville Police Department to protect the constitutional rights of people to peaceably assemble and exercise their rights to free speech. It is the policy of this department to effectively manage crowds in order to allow lawful exercise of rights while also preserving the peace, protecting life, and preventing the destruction of property.

425.3 GENERAL CONSIDERATIONS

Individuals or groups present on the public way, such as public facilities, streets or walkways, generally have the right to assemble, rally, demonstrate, protest or otherwise express their views and opinions through varying forms of communication, including the distribution of printed matter. These rights may be limited by laws or ordinances regulating such matters as the obstruction of individual or vehicle access or egress, trespass, or noise. However, officers shall not take action or fail to take action based on the opinions being expressed.

Participant behavior during a demonstration or other public assembly can vary. This may include, but is not limited to:

- Lawful, constitutionally protected actions and speech
- Civil disobedience (typically involving minor criminal acts)
- Rioting

All of these behaviors may be present during the same event. Therefore, it is imperative that law enforcement actions are measured and appropriate for the behaviors officers may encounter. This is particularly critical if force is being used. Adaptable strategies and tactics are essential. The purpose of a law enforcement presence at the scene of public assemblies and demonstrations should be to preserve the peace, to protect life, and prevent the destruction of property.

Officers should not:

- (a) Engage in assembly or demonstration-related discussion with participants
- (b) Harass, confront or intimidate participants
- (c) Seize the cameras, cell phones or materials of participants or observers unless an officer is placing a person under lawful arrest

Supervisors should continually observe department members under their commands to ensure that members' interaction with participants and their response to crowd dynamics is appropriate.

First Amendment Assemblies

425.3.1 PHOTOGRAPHS AND VIDEO RECORDINGS

Photographs and video recording, when appropriate, can serve a number of purposes, including support of criminal prosecutions by documenting criminal acts; assistance in evaluating department performance; serving as training material; recording the use of dispersal orders; and facilitating a response to allegations of improper law enforcement conduct.

Photographs and videos will not be used or retained for the sole purpose of collecting or maintaining information about the political, religious or social views of associations, or the activities of any individual, group, association, organization, corporation, business or partnership, unless such information directly relates to an investigation of criminal activities and there is reasonable suspicion that the subject of the information is involved in criminal conduct.

Members of the general public have an unambiguous First Amendment right to record police officers while they are conducting official business, including recording police activities at an assembly, unless such recordings impede police activity. Officers shall not tell people that recording police activity is not allowed, requires a permit, or requires an officer's consent.

425.4 UNPLANNED EVENTS

When responding to an unplanned or spontaneous public gathering, the first responding officer should conduct an assessment of conditions, including, but not limited to, the following:

- Location
- Number of participants
- Apparent purpose of the event
- Leadership (whether it is apparent and/or whether it is effective)
- Any initial indicators of unlawful or disruptive activity
- Indicators that lawful use of public facilities, streets or walkways will be impacted
- Ability and/or need to continue monitoring the incident

Initial assessment information should be promptly communicated to Dispatch, and the assignment of a supervisor should be requested. Additional resources should be requested as appropriate. The responding supervisor shall assume command of the incident until command is expressly assumed by another, and the assumption of command is communicated to the involved members. A clearly defined command structure that is consistent with the Incident Command System (ICS) should be established as resources are deployed.

425.5 PLANNED EVENT PREPARATION

For planned events, comprehensive, incident-specific operational plans may be developed. The ICS may be considered for such events.

First Amendment Assemblies

425.5.1 INFORMATION GATHERING AND ASSESSMENT

In order to properly assess the potential impact of a public assembly or demonstration on public safety and order, relevant information should be collected and vetted. This may include:

- Information obtained from outreach to group organizers or leaders.
- Information about past and potential unlawful conduct associated with the event or similar events.
- The potential time, duration, scope, and type of planned activities.
- Any other information related to the goal of providing a balanced response to criminal activity and the protection of public safety interests.

Information will be obtained in a lawful manner and will not be based solely on the purpose or content of the assembly or demonstration, or actual or perceived characteristics such as race, ethnicity, national origin, immigration status, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender identity or expression, economic status, age, cultural group, or disability of the participants (or any other characteristic that is unrelated to criminal conduct or the identification of a criminal subject).

425.5.2 OPERATIONAL PLANS

An operational planning team with responsibility for event planning and management should be established. The planning team should develop an operational plan for the event.

The operational plan will minimally provide for the following:

- (a) Command assignments, chain of command structure, roles, and responsibilities
- (b) Staffing and resource allocation
- (c) Management of criminal investigations
- (d) Designation of uniform of the day and related safety equipment (e.g., helmets, shields)
 1. Uniforms must display the Department name and a unique personal identifier.
 2. A protocol for keeping record of any officers on scene who are not in compliance with uniform requirements due to exigent circumstances.
 3. Unless part of the designated uniform, inclement weather, to protect the identity of an officer serving in an undercover role or authorized by Policy 1017, wearing a covering that conceals facial identity is not permitted.
- (e) Deployment of specialized resources
- (f) Event communications and interoperability in a multijurisdictional event
- (g) Liaison with demonstration leaders and external agencies
- (h) Liaison with City government and legal staff
- (i) Media relations
- (j) Logistics: food, fuel, replacement equipment, duty hours, relief, and transportation
- (k) Traffic management plans

First Amendment Assemblies

- (l) First aid and emergency medical service provider availability
- (m) Prisoner transport and detention
- (n) Review of policies regarding public assemblies and use of force in crowd control
- (o) Parameters for declaring an unlawful assembly (as defined by Minn. Stat. § 609.705)
- (p) Arrest protocol, including management of mass arrests
- (q) Protocol for recording information flow and decisions
- (r) Rules of engagement, including rules of conduct, protocols for field force extraction and arrests, and any authorization required for the use of force
- (s) Protocol for handling complaints during the event
- (t) Parameters for the use of body-worn cameras and other portable recording devices

425.5.3 MUTUAL AID AND EXTERNAL RESOURCES

The magnitude and anticipated duration of an event may necessitate interagency cooperation and coordination. The assigned Incident Commander should ensure that any required memorandums of understanding or other agreements are properly executed, and that any anticipated mutual aid is requested and facilitated.

425.6 UNLAWFUL ASSEMBLY DISPERSAL ORDERS

If a public gathering or demonstration remains peaceful and nonviolent, and there is no reasonably imminent threat to persons or property, the Incident Commander should generally authorize continued monitoring of the event.

Should the Incident Commander make a determination that public safety is presently or is about to be jeopardized, the Incident Commander or the authorized designee should attempt to verbally persuade event organizers or participants to disperse of their own accord. Warnings and advisements may be communicated through established communications links with leaders and/or participants or to the group.

When initial attempts at verbal persuasion are unsuccessful, and if the Incident Commander has determined that individuals in the assembly are committing unlawful acts by force, or conducting themselves in a disorderly manner so as to disturb or threaten the public peace, the Incident Commander or the authorized designee should make a clear standardized announcement to the gathering that the event is an unlawful assembly, and should order the dispersal of the participants. The announcement should be communicated by whatever methods are reasonably available to ensure that the content of the message is clear and that it has been heard by the participants. The announcement should be amplified, made in different languages as appropriate, made from multiple locations in the affected area and documented by audio and video. The announcement should provide information about what law enforcement actions will take place if illegal behavior continues and should identify routes for egress (at least two routes when possible). A reasonable time to disperse should be allowed following a dispersal order.

Additionally, the dispersal order must include:

First Amendment Assemblies

- (a) The name and rank of the person and agency giving the order.
- (b) The reasons for the declaration.
- (c) How long the participants have to comply.

The dispersal announcements should be repeated after commencement of the initial dispersal order so that participants understand that they must leave the area.

If, after a crowd disperses pursuant to a declaration of unlawful assembly and subsequently participants assemble at a different geographic location where the participants are engaged in non-violent and lawful First Amendment activity, such an assembly cannot be dispersed unless it has been determined that it is an unlawful assembly, and a new declaration of unlawful assembly has been made.

425.6.1 MINNESOTA POST GUIDELINES ON UNLAWFUL ASSEMBLY

The mere failure to obtain a permit, such as a parade permit or sound permit, is not a sufficient basis to declare an unlawful assembly.

The fact that some of the demonstrators or organizing groups have engaged in violent or unlawful acts on prior occasions or demonstrations is not grounds for declaring an assembly unlawful.

Whenever possible, the unlawful behavior of a few participants must not result in the majority of peaceful protestors being deprived of their First Amendment rights, unless other participants or officers are threatened with dangerous circumstances.

425.7 USE OF FORCE

Use of force is governed by current department policy and applicable law (see the Use of Force, Handcuffing and Restraints, Control Devices, and Conducted Energy Device policies).

Individuals refusing to comply with lawful orders (e.g., nonviolent refusal to disperse) should be given a clear verbal warning and a reasonable opportunity to comply. If an individual refuses to comply with lawful orders, the Incident Commander shall evaluate the type of resistance and adopt a reasonable response in order to accomplish the law enforcement mission (such as dispersal or arrest of those acting in violation of the law). Control devices and conducted energy devices should be considered only when the participants' conduct reasonably appears to present the potential to harm officers, themselves or others, or will result in substantial property loss or damage (see the Control Devices and the Conducted Energy Device policies).

Force or control devices, including oleoresin capsaicin (OC), should be directed toward individuals and not toward groups or crowds, unless specific individuals cannot reasonably be targeted due to extreme circumstances, such as a riotous crowd.

Any use of force by a member of this department shall be documented promptly, completely, and accurately in an appropriate report. The type of report required may depend on the nature of the incident.

First Amendment Assemblies

425.8 ARRESTS

The Roseville Police Department should respond to unlawful behavior in a manner that is consistent with the operational plan. If practicable, warnings or advisements should be communicated prior to arrest.

Mass arrests should be employed only when alternate tactics and strategies have been, or reasonably appear likely to be, unsuccessful. Mass arrests shall only be undertaken upon the order of the Incident Commander or the authorized designee. There must be probable cause for each arrest.

If employed, mass arrest protocols should fully integrate:

- (a) Reasonable measures to address the safety of officers and arrestees.
- (b) Dedicated arrest, booking and report writing teams.
- (c) Timely access to medical care.
- (d) Timely access to legal resources.
- (e) Timely processing of arrestees.
- (f) Full accountability for arrestees and evidence.
- (g) Coordination and cooperation with the prosecuting authority, jail and courts (see the Citation Releases Policy).

425.9 MEDIA RELATIONS

The Public Information Officer may use avenues of communication, including but not limited to press releases, briefings, press conferences and social media to maintain open channels of communication with media representatives and the public about the status and progress of the event, taking all opportunities to reassure the public about the professional management of the event.

425.10 DEMOBILIZATION

When appropriate, the Incident Commander or the authorized designee should implement a phased and orderly withdrawal of law enforcement resources. All relieved personnel should promptly complete any required reports, including use of force reports, and account for all issued equipment and vehicles to their supervisors prior to returning to normal operational duties.

425.11 POST EVENT

The Incident Commander should designate a member to assemble full documentation of the event, to include the following:

- (a) Operational plan
- (b) Any incident logs
- (c) Any assignment logs
- (d) Vehicle, fuel, equipment, and supply records

First Amendment Assemblies

- (e) Incident, arrest, use of force, injury, and property damage reports
- (f) Photographs, audio/video recordings, Dispatch records/tapes
- (g) Media accounts (print and broadcast media)
- (h) Record of any unlawful assembly declarations

425.11.1 AFTER-ACTION REPORTING

The Incident Commander should work with City legal counsel, as appropriate, to prepare a comprehensive after-action report of the event, explaining all incidents where force was used including the following:

- (a) Date, time and description of the event
- (b) Actions taken and outcomes (e.g., injuries, property damage, arrests)
- (c) Problems identified
- (d) Significant events
- (e) Recommendations for improvement; opportunities for training should be documented in a generic manner, without identifying individuals or specific incidents, facts or circumstances.

425.12 TRAINING

Department members should receive periodic training regarding this policy, as well as the dynamics of crowd control and incident management. The Department should, when practicable, train with its external and mutual aid partners.

425.13 ADDITIONAL INCIDENT COMMANDER RESPONSIBILITIES

The Incident Commander is responsible for maintaining familiarity with the Minnesota model policy on Public Assembly and First Amendment Activity and incorporating additional protocols as appropriate for the department's preparedness in addressing:

- (a) Approved devices, tactics, and munitions.
- (b) Accessibility to the public assembly or demonstration by media representatives and other observers.
- (c) Additional documentation requirements, if any.

1) PURPOSE

The First Amendment to the Constitution of the United States of America states, "Congress shall make no law respecting an establishment of religion, or prohibiting the free exercise thereof, or abridging the freedom of speech or of the press, or the right of the people peaceably to assemble and to petition the Government for a redress of grievances."

The Bill of Rights in Article 1 of the [Minnesota Constitution](#) addresses the rights of free speech and the liberty of the press. However, neither the state nor federal constitutions protect criminal activity or threats against citizens, businesses, or critical infrastructure.

The [\(law enforcement agency\)](#) supports all people's fundamental right to peaceably assemble and their right to freedom of speech and expression.

The purpose of this policy is to provide guidelines to the [\(law enforcement agency\)](#) personnel regarding the application and operation of acceptable law enforcement actions addressing public assemblies and First Amendment Activity.

2) POLICY

The [\(law enforcement agency\)](#) will uphold the constitutional rights of free speech and assembly while using the minimum use of physical force and authority required to address a crowd management or crowd control issue.

The policy of the [\(law enforcement agency\)](#) ("department") regarding crowd management and crowd control is to apply the appropriate level of direction and control to protect life, property, and vital facilities while maintaining public peace and order during a public assembly or First Amendment activity. Department personnel must not harass, intimidate, or discriminate against or unreasonably interfere with persons engaged in the lawful exercise of their rights.

This policy concerning crowd management, crowd control, crowd dispersal, and police responses to violence and disorder applies to spontaneous demonstrations, crowd event situations, and planned demonstration or crowd events regardless of the permit status of

the event.

This policy is to be reviewed annually.

3) DEFINITIONS

- A. Chemical Agent Munitions: Munitions designed to deliver chemical agents from a launcher or hand thrown.
- B. Control Holds: Control holds are soft empty hand control techniques as they do not involve striking.
- C. Crowd Management: Techniques used to manage lawful public assemblies before, during, and after an event. Crowd management can be accomplished in part through coordination with event planners and group leaders, permit monitoring, and past event critiques.
- D. Crowd Control: Techniques used to address unlawful public assemblies.
- E. Deadly Force: Force used by an officer that the officer knows, or reasonably should know, creates a substantial risk of causing death or great bodily harm. (Reference: (law enforcement agency's) Use of Force Policy, MN Statutes [609.06 and 609. 066](#))
- F. Direct Fired Munitions: Less-lethal impact munitions that are designed to be direct fired at a specific target.
- G. First Amendment Activities: First Amendment activities include all forms of speech and expressive conduct used to convey ideas and/or information, express grievances, or otherwise communicate with others and include both verbal and non-verbal expression. Common First Amendment activities include, but are not limited to, speeches, demonstrations, vigils, picketing, distribution of literature, displaying banners or signs, street theater, and other artistic forms of expression. All these activities involve the freedom of speech, association, and assembly and the right to petition the government, as guaranteed by the United States Constitution and the [Minnesota State Constitution](#).

The government may impose reasonable restrictions on the time, place, or manner of protected speech, provided the restrictions are justified without reference to the content of the regulated speech, that they are narrowly tailored to serve a significant governmental interest, and that they leave open ample alternative channels for communication of the information.
- H. Great Bodily Harm: Bodily injury which creates a high probability of death, or which causes serious, permanent disfigurement, or which causes a permanent or protracted loss or impairment of the function of any bodily member or organ or other serious bodily harm. (Reference: (law enforcement agency's) Use of Force Policy, MN Statutes [609.06 and 609. 066](#))
- I. Legal Observers – Individuals, usually representatives of civilian human rights agencies, who attend public demonstrations, protests and other activities. The following may be indicia of a legal observer: Wearing a green National Lawyers' Guild issued or authorized Legal Observer hat and/or vest (a green NLG hat and/or black vest with green labels) or wearing a blue ACLU issued or authorized legal observer vest.
- J. Less-lethal Impact Munitions. Impact munitions which can be fired, launched, or

otherwise propelled for the purpose of encouraging compliance, overcoming resistance or preventing serious injury without posing significant potential of causing death.

- K. **Media:** Media means any person who is an employee, agent, or independent contractor of any newspaper, magazine or other periodical, book publisher, news agency, wire service, radio or television station or network, cable or satellite station or network, or audio or audiovisual production company, or any entity that is in the regular business of news gathering and disseminating news or information to the public by any means, including, but not limited to, print, broadcast, photographic, mechanical, internet, or electronic distribution. For purposes of this policy, the following are indicia of being a member of the media: visual identification as a member of the press, such as by displaying a professional or authorized press pass or wearing a professional or authorized press badge or some distinctive clothing that identifies the wearer as a member of the press.

4) Law Enforcement Procedures

- A. **Uniform:** All officers responding to public assemblies must at all times, including when wearing protective gear, display their agency name and a unique personal identifier in compliance with this department's uniform policy. The chief law enforcement officer must maintain a record of any officer(s) at the scene who is not in compliance with this requirement due to exigent circumstances.
- B. **Officer conduct:**
1. Officers shall avoid negative verbal engagement with members of the crowd. Verbal abuse against officers does not constitute a reason for an arrest or for any use of force against such individuals.
 2. Officers must maintain professional demeanor and remain neutral in word and deed despite unlawful or anti-social behavior on the part of crowd members.
 3. Officers must not take action or fail to take action based on the opinions being expressed.
 4. Officers must not interfere with the rights of members of the public to observe and document police conduct via video, photographs, or other methods unless doing so interferes with on-going police activity.
 5. Officers must not use a weapon or munition unless the officer has been trained in the use and qualified in deployment of the weapon/munition.
 6. This policy does not preclude officers from taking appropriate action to direct crowd and vehicular movement; enforce ordinances and statutes; and to maintain the safety of the crowd, the general public, law enforcement personnel, and emergency personnel.

5. Responses to Crowd Situations

- A. **Lawful assembly.** Individuals or groups present on the public way, such as public facilities, streets or walkways, generally have the right to assemble, rally, demonstrate, protest, or otherwise express their views and opinions through varying forms of communication including the distribution of printed matter. These rights may be limited by laws or ordinances regulating such matters as the obstruction of individual or vehicle access or egress, trespass, noise, picketing, distribution of handbills, leafleting and

loitering.

B. Unlawful assembly

1. The definition of an unlawful assembly has been set forth in Minnesota Statute [§609.705](#).
2. The mere failure to obtain a permit, such as a parade permit or sound permit, is not a sufficient basis to declare an unlawful assembly
3. The fact that some of the demonstrators or organizing groups have engaged in violent or unlawful acts on prior occasions or demonstrations is not grounds for declaring an assembly unlawful.
4. Whenever possible, the unlawful behavior of a few participants must not result in the majority of peaceful protestors being deprived of their First Amendment rights, unless other participants or officers are threatened with dangerous circumstances.
5. Unless emergency or dangerous circumstances prevent negotiation, crowd dispersal techniques must not be initiated until after attempts have been made through contacts with the police liaisons and demonstration or crowd event leaders to negotiate a resolution of the situation so that the unlawful activity will cease, and the First Amendment activity can continue.

C. Declaration of Unlawful Assembly

1. If the on-scene supervisor/incident commander has declared an unlawful assembly, the reasons for the declaration and the names of the decision maker(s) must be recorded. The declaration and dispersal order must be announced to the assembly. The name(s) of the officers announcing the declaration should be recorded, with the time(s) and date(s) documented.
2. The dispersal order must include:
 - a) Name, rank of person, and agency giving the order
 - b) Declaration of Unlawful Assembly and reason(s) for declaration
 - c) Egress or escape routes that may be used
 - d) Specific consequences of failure to comply with dispersal order
 - e) How long the group has to comply
3. Whenever possible, dispersal orders should also be given in other languages that are appropriate for the audience. Officers must recognize that not all crowd members may be fluent in the language(s) used in the dispersal order.
4. Dispersal announcements must be made in a manner that will ensure that they are audible over a sufficient area. Dispersal announcements-must be made from different locations when the demonstration is large and noisy. The dispersal announcements should be repeated after commencement of the dispersal operation so that persons not present at the original broadcast will understand that they must leave the area. The announcements must also specify adequate egress or escape routes. Whenever possible, a minimum of two escape/egress routes shall be identified and announced.

D. Crowd Dispersal

1. Crowd dispersal techniques should not be initiated until officers have made repeated announcements to the crowd, or are aware that repeated announcements

- have been made, asking members of the crowd to voluntarily disperse, and informing them that, if they do not disperse, they will be subject to arrest.
2. Unless an immediate risk to public safety exists or significant property damage is occurring, sufficient time will be allowed for a crowd to comply with officer commands before action is taken.
 3. If negotiations and verbal announcements to disperse do not result in voluntary movement of the crowd, officers may employ additional crowd dispersal tactics, but only after orders from the on-scene supervisor/incident commander. The use of these crowd dispersal tactics shall be consistent with the department policy of using the minimal officer intervention needed to address a crowd management or control issue.
 4. If, after a crowd disperses pursuant to a declaration of unlawful assembly and subsequently participants assemble at a different geographic location where the participants are engaged in non-violent and lawful First Amendment activity, such an assembly cannot be dispersed unless it has been determined that it is an unlawful assembly, and a new declaration of unlawful assembly has been made.

6. Tactics and Weapons to Disperse or Control a Non-Compliant Crowd

Nothing in this policy prohibits officers' abilities to use appropriate force options to defend themselves or others as defined in the (law enforcement agency's) Use of Force policy.

A. Use of Batons

1. Batons must not be used for crowd control, crowd containment, or crowd dispersal except as specified below.
2. Batons may be visibly displayed and held in a ready position during squad or platoon formations.
3. When reasonably necessary for protection of the officers or to disperse individuals in the crowd pursuant to the procedures of this policy, batons may be used in a pushing, pulling, or jabbing motion. Baton jabs must not be used indiscriminately against a crowd or group of persons but only against individuals who are physically aggressive or actively resisting arrest. Baton jabs should not be used in a crowd control situation against an individual who is attempting to comply but is physically unable to disperse or move because of the press of the crowd or some other fixed obstacle.
4. Officers must not strike a person with any baton to the head, neck, throat, kidneys, spine, or groin, or jab with force to the armpit unless the person has created an imminent threat of great bodily harm to another.
5. Batons shall not be used against a person who is handcuffed except when permissible under this department's Use of Force policy and state law.

B. Restrictions on Crowd Control and Crowd Dispersal

1. Canines. Canines must not be used for crowd control, crowd containment, or crowd dispersal.
2. Fire Hoses. Fire hoses must not be used for crowd control, crowd containment, or crowd dispersal.
3. Electronic Control Weapons (ECWs) must not be used for crowd control, crowd

containment, or crowd dispersal.

4. Motorcycles and police vehicles must not be used for crowd dispersal, but may be used for purposes of observation, visible deterrence, traffic control, transportation, and area control during a crowd event.
5. Skip Fired Specialty Impact Less-Lethal Munitions (Wooden Dowels and Stinger Grenades) may be used as a last resort if other crowd dispersal techniques have failed or have been deemed ineffective.
6. Direct Fired munitions may never be used indiscriminately against a crowd or group of persons even if some members of the crowd or group are violent or disruptive.
 - a) Except for exigent circumstances, the on-scene supervisor/incident commander must authorize the deployment of Direct Fired munitions. Direct Fired munitions must be used only against a specific individual who is engaging in conduct that poses an immediate threat of loss of life or serious bodily injury to them self, officers, or the general public; or is creating an imminent risk to the lives or safety of other persons through the substantial destruction of property.
 - b) Officers shall not discharge a Direct Fired munitions at a person's head, neck, throat, face, left armpit, spine, kidneys, or groin unless deadly force would be justified.
 - c) When circumstances permit, the on-scene supervisor/incident commander must make an attempt to accomplish the policing goal without the use of Direct Fired munitions as described above, and, if practical, an audible warning shall be given to the subject before deployment of the weapon.
7. Aerosol Hand-held Chemical Agents must not be used in a demonstration or crowd situation or other civil disorders without the approval of the on-scene supervisor/incident commander.
 - a) Aerosol, hand-held, pressurized, containerized chemical agents that emit a stream shall not be used for crowd management, crowd control, or crowd dispersal during demonstrations or crowd events. Aerosol hand-held chemical agents may not be used indiscriminately against a crowd or group of persons, but only against specific individuals who are engaged in specific acts of serious unlawful conduct or who are actively resisting arrest.
 - b) Officers shall use the minimum amount of the chemical agent necessary to overcome the subject's resistance.
 - c) When possible, persons should be removed quickly from any area where hand held chemical agents have been used. Officers must monitor the subject and pay particular attention to the subject's ability to breathe following the application of a chemical agent.
 - d) A subject who has been sprayed with a hand-held chemical agent shall not be left lying on their stomach once handcuffed or restrained with any device.
9. Chemical munitions use in a crowd situation is subject to the following:
 - a) Chemical munitions must be used only when:
 - 1) a threat of imminent harm or serious property damage is present, or

other crowd dispersal techniques have failed or did not accomplish the policing goal as determined by the incident commander,

- 2) sufficient egress to safely allow the crowd to disperse exists, and
 - 3) The use of chemical munitions is approved by the on-scene supervisor/incident commander, and
- b) When feasible, additional announcements should be made prior to the use of chemical munitions in a crowd situation warning of the imminent use of chemical munitions.
 - c) Deployment of chemical munitions into a crowd must be avoided to prevent unnecessary injuries.
 - d) CN chemical munitions are prohibited.
 - e) The use of each chemical munition must be recorded (time, location), and the following information must be made available by the department on request :
 - 1) the name of each chemical munition used in an incident,
 - 2) the location and time of use for each munition deployment,
 - 3) access to the safety data sheet (SDS) for chemical munition
 - f) Where extensive use of chemical munitions would reasonably be anticipated to impact nearby residents or businesses, agencies should consider proactively notifying impacted individuals of safety information related to the munitions use as soon as possible, even if after the event.
 - g) When chemical munitions are used, an emergency responder will be on standby at a safe distance near the target area when feasible.
 - h) Chemical munitions are subject to the same procedural requirements as outlined in the (law enforcement department)'s UOF policy.

C. Arrests

1. If the crowd has failed to disperse after the required announcements and sufficient time to disperse, officers may encircle the crowd or a portion of the crowd for purposes of making multiple simultaneous arrests.
2. Persons who make it clear (e.g., by non-violent civil disobedience) that they seek to be arrested may be arrested and must not be subjected to other dispersal techniques, such as the use of batons or chemical agents. Persons refusing to comply with arrest procedures may be subject to the reasonable use of force.
3. Arrests of non-violent persons shall be accomplished by verbal commands and persuasion, handcuffing, lifting, carrying, the use of dollies and/or stretchers, and/or the use of soft empty hand control holds.
4. Officers must document any injuries reported by an arrestee, and as soon as practical, officers must obtain professional medical treatment for the arrestee.
5. Juveniles arrested in demonstrations shall be handled consistent with department policy on arrest, transportation, and detention of juveniles.
6. Officers arresting a person with a disability affecting mobility or communication must follow the department policy on arrest, transportation, and detention of persons with disabilities.

6. Handcuffs

- A. All persons subject to arrest during a demonstration or crowd event shall be handcuffed in accordance with department policy, orders, and training bulletins.
- B. Officers should be cognizant that flex-cuffs may tighten when arrestees hands swell or move, sometimes simply in response to pain from the cuffs themselves. When arrestees complain of pain from overly tight flex cuffs, officers must examine the cuffs and ensure proper fit.
- C. Arrestees in flex-cuffs must be monitored to prevent injury.
- D. Each unit involved in detention and/or transportation of arrestees with flex-cuffs should have a flex-cuff cutter and adequate supplies of extra flex-cuffs readily available.

7. Media.

- A. The media have a First Amendment right to cover public activity, including the right to record video or film, livestream, photograph, or use other mediums.
- B. The media must not be restricted to an identified area, and must be permitted to observe and must be permitted close enough access to view the crowd event and any arrests. An onsite supervisor/incident commander may identify an area where media may choose to assemble.
- C. Officers will not arrest members of the media unless they are physically obstructing lawful efforts to disperse the crowd, or efforts to arrest participants, or engaged in criminal activity.
- D. The media must not be targeted for dispersal or enforcement action because of their media status.
- E. Even after a dispersal order has been given, clearly identified media must be permitted to carry out their professional duties unless their presence would unduly interfere with the enforcement action.

8. Legal Observers

- A. Legal observers, including unaffiliated self-identified legal observers and crowd monitors, do not have the same legal status as the media, and are subject to laws and orders similar to any other person or citizen.
- B. Legal observers and monitors must comply with all dispersal orders unless the on-site supervisor/incident commander chooses to allow such an individual legal observers and monitors to remain in an area after a dispersal order.
- C. Legal observers and crowd monitors must not be targeted for dispersal or enforcement action because of their status.

9. Documentation of Public Assembly and First Amendment Activity

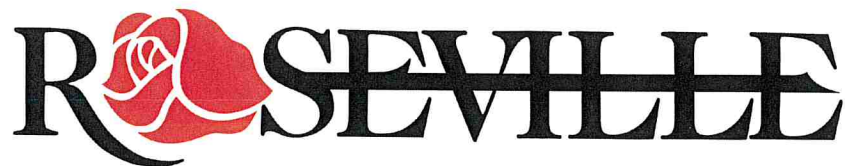
- A. The purpose of any visual documentation by (law enforcement agency) of a public assembly or first amendment activity must be related only to:
 - 1) Documentation of the event for the purposes of debriefing,
 - 2) Documentation to establish a visual record for the purposes of responding to citizen complaints or legal challenges, or
 - 3) Creating visual records for training purposes.

- B. If it is the policy of (law enforcement agency) to videotape and photograph, it must be done in a manner that minimizes interference with people lawfully participating in First Amendment activities. Videotaping and photographing of First Amendment activities must take place only when authorized by the on-site supervisor/incident commander.
 - C. Individuals should not be singled out for photographing or recording simply because they appear to be leaders, organizers, or speakers.
 - D. Unless evidence of criminal activity is provided, videos or photographs of demonstrations shall not be disseminated to other government agencies, including federal, state, and local law enforcement agencies. If videos or photographs are disseminated or shared with another law enforcement agency, a record should be created and maintained noting the date and recipient of the information.
 - E. If there are no pending criminal prosecutions arising from the demonstration or if the video recording or photographing is not relevant to an Internal Affairs or citizen complaint investigation or proceedings or to civil litigation arising from police conduct at the demonstration, the video recording and/or photographs shall be destroyed in accordance with department policies.
 - F. This directive shall not prohibit department members from using these videos or footage from such videos as part of training materials for officers in crowd control and crowd dispersal techniques and procedures.

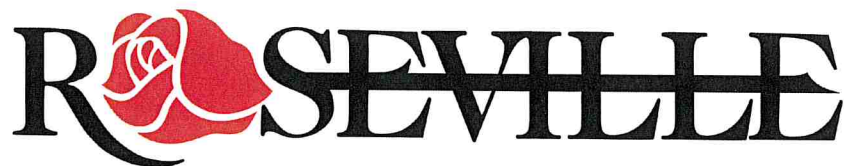

Automated License Plate Readers (ALPR)

420.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The purpose of this policy is to provide guidance for the capture, storage and use of digital data obtained through the use of Automated License Plate Reader (ALPR) technology (Minn. Stat. § 626.8472).

420.2 POLICY

The policy of the Roseville Police Department is to utilize ALPR technology to capture and store digital license plate data and images while recognizing the established privacy rights of the public.

All data and images captured by the Automated License Plate Reader (ALPR) system are collected for official law enforcement purposes and are classified and handled in accordance with the Minnesota Government Data Practices Act. Such data are not subject to public disclosure except as authorized by law.

420.3 ADMINISTRATION

The ALPR technology, also known as License Plate Recognition (LPR), allows for the automated detection of license plates. It is used by the Roseville Police Department to convert data associated with vehicle license plates for official law enforcement purposes, including identifying stolen or wanted vehicles, stolen license plates and missing persons. It may also be used to gather information related to active warrants, suspect interdiction and stolen property recovery.

All installation and maintenance of ALPR equipment, as well as ALPR data retention and access, shall be managed by the Deputy Chief. The Deputy Chief will assign members under his/her command to administer the day-to-day operation of the ALPR equipment and data.

420.4 OPERATIONS

Use of an ALPR is restricted to the purposes outlined below. Department members shall not use, or allow others to use, the equipment or database records for any unauthorized purpose.

- (a) An ALPR shall only be used for official law enforcement business.
- (b) An ALPR may be used in conjunction with any routine patrol operation or criminal investigation. Reasonable suspicion or probable cause is not necessary before using an ALPR.
- (c) While an ALPR may be used to canvass license plates around any crime scene, particular consideration should be given to using ALPR-equipped cars to canvass areas around homicides, shootings and other major incidents.
- (d) No member of this department shall operate ALPR equipment or access ALPR data without first completing department-approved training.
- (e) No ALPR operator may access confidential department, state or federal data unless authorized to do so.

Automated License Plate Readers (ALPR)

- (f) If practicable, the officer should verify an ALPR response through the Minnesota Justice Information Services (MNJIS) and National Law Enforcement Telecommunications System (NLETS) databases before taking enforcement action that is based solely upon an ALPR alert.

420.4.1 RESTRICTIONS, NOTIFICATIONS AND AUDITS

The Roseville Police Department will observe the following guidelines regarding ALPR use (Minn. Stat. § 13.824):

- (a) Data collected by an ALPR will be limited to:
 1. License plate numbers.
 2. Date, time and location of data captured.
 3. Pictures of license plates, vehicles and areas surrounding the vehicle captured.
- (b) ALPR data may only be matched with the Minnesota license plate data file, unless additional sources are needed for an active criminal investigation.
- (c) ALPRs shall not be used to monitor or track an individual unless done so under a search warrant or because of exigent circumstances.
- (d) The Bureau of Criminal Apprehension shall be notified within 10 days of any installation or use and of any fixed location of an ALPR.

420.5 DATA COLLECTION AND RETENTION

The Deputy Chief is responsible for ensuring systems and processes are in place for the proper collection and retention of ALPR data. Data will be transferred from vehicles to the designated storage in accordance with department procedures.

ALPR data received from another agency shall be maintained securely and released in the same manner as ALPR data collected by this department (Minn. Stat. § 13.824).

ALPR data not related to an active criminal investigation must be destroyed no later than 60 days from the date of collection with the following exceptions (Minn. Stat. § 13.824):

- (a) Exculpatory evidence - Data must be retained until a criminal matter is resolved if a written request is made from a person who is the subject of a criminal investigation asserting that ALPR data may be used as exculpatory evidence.
- (b) Address Confidentiality Program - Data related to a participant of the Address Confidentiality Program must be destroyed upon the written request of the participant. ALPR data already collected at the time of the request shall be destroyed and future related ALPR data must be destroyed at the time of collection. Destruction can be deferred if it relates to an active criminal investigation.

All other ALPR data should be retained in accordance with the established records retention schedule.

420.5.1 LOG OF USE

A public log of ALPR use will be maintained that includes (Minn. Stat. § 13.824):

Automated License Plate Readers (ALPR)

- (a) Specific times of day that the ALPR collected data.
- (b) The aggregate number of vehicles or license plates on which data are collected for each period of active use and a list of all state and federal public databases with which the data were compared.
- (c) For each period of active use, the number of vehicles or license plates related to:
 - 1. A vehicle or license plate that has been stolen.
 - 2. A warrant for the arrest of the owner of the vehicle.
 - 3. An owner with a suspended or revoked driver's license or similar category.
 - 4. Active investigative data.
- (d) For an ALPR at a stationary or fixed location, the location at which the ALPR actively collected data and is installed and used.

A publicly accessible list of the current and previous locations, including dates at those locations, of any fixed ALPR or other surveillance devices with ALPR capability shall be maintained. The list may be kept from the public if the data is security information as provided in Minn. Stat. § 13.37, Subd. 2.

420.6 ACCOUNTABILITY

All saved data will be closely safeguarded and protected by both procedural and technological means. The Roseville Police Department will observe the following safeguards regarding access to and use of stored data (Minn. Stat. § 13.824; Minn. Stat. § 13.05):

- (a) All ALPR data downloaded to the mobile workstation and in storage shall be accessible only through a login/password-protected system capable of documenting all access of information by name, date and time.
- (b) Members approved to access ALPR data under these guidelines are permitted to access the data for legitimate law enforcement purposes only, such as when the data relate to a specific criminal investigation or department-related civil or administrative action.
- (c) Biennial audits and reports shall be completed pursuant to Minn. Stat. § 13.824, Subd. 6.
- (d) Breaches of personal data are addressed as set forth in the Protected Information Policy (Minn. Stat. § 13.055).
- (e) All queries and responses, and all actions, in which data are entered, updated, accessed, shared or disseminated, must be recorded in a data audit trail.
- (f) Any member who violates Minn. Stat. § 13.09 through the unauthorized acquisition or use of ALPR data will face discipline and possible criminal prosecution (Minn. Stat. § 626.8472).

Automated License Plate Readers (ALPR)

420.7 RELEASING ALPR DATA

The ALPR data may be shared only with other law enforcement or prosecutorial agencies for official law enforcement purposes or as otherwise permitted by law, using the following procedures (Minn. Stat. § 13.824):

The Roseville Police Department will not use or share Automated License Plate Reader (ALPR) data for the purpose of enforcing federal civil immigration laws or assisting in immigration enforcement activities, except as required by law or court order.

- (a) The agency makes a written request for the ALPR data that includes:
 - 1. The name of the agency.
 - 2. The name of the person requesting.
 - 3. The intended purpose of obtaining the information.
 - 4. A record of the factual basis for the access and any associated case number, complaint or incident that is the basis for the access.
 - 5. A statement that the request is authorized by the head of the requesting law enforcement agency or his/her designee.
- (b) The request is reviewed by the Deputy Chief or the authorized designee and approved before the request is fulfilled.
 - 1. A release must be based on a reasonable suspicion that the data is pertinent to an active criminal investigation.
- (c) The approved request is retained on file.

Requests for ALPR data by non-law enforcement or non-prosecutorial agencies will be processed as provided in the Records Maintenance and Release Policy.

On Friday, 1/16 at around 4:20 P.M., I observed what was later to be confirmed via vehicle license plate # to be an ICE agent outside the door of my neighbors house dressed in khaki pants, black sweatshirt, a high-visibility yellow vest, and bright yellow hat across the street. My neighbors at residence 1130 Summer Street are in their mid 80s, and live with their middle aged son who has cognitive delay. I witnessed the ICE agent speaking at the front door to their middle aged son for quite some time, and clocked this to be suspicious due to the day/time, outfit, and the highly tinted Chevy car on our street. My next door neighbor

and I are trained legal observers, and we notified our rapid response Roseville chats of what we were observing. I have video footage of the entire encounter, which I would like to share with City Council. I also have evidence to prove and corroborate that the car I witnessed on our street is a valid ICE vehicle that was involved in an abduction ~47 days ago at Marcey Homes in Saint Paul- same Chevy with tinted windows, and license plate number. The ICE agent had a long extendable metal stick that he later placed his phone on, and walked around the property taking photos/video of the exterior. I had to make the calculated risk of taking video footage for evidence, which was incredibly stressful due to the fact that we have immigrant and families and families of color on our street who are vulnerable to what is going on in our cities right now. Two rapid responders showed up in minutes, and shortly after, the ICE agent departed the residence. I can confirm from my involvement with rapid response networks in Roseville that ICE agents have begun to wear highly visible vests as a way to conceal their standard uniforms, which also allow them operate in plain sight. On Sunday, 1/18, I approached the male elderly homeowner asking, "I noticed you had a visitor on Friday afternoon, we were concerned. What was going on?" In response he stated that it was the "insurance company," who he "was not expecting to visit," and that he needed to take photos of the property. It has been confirmed by watch groups and news sources that ICE agents have been collecting and have access to private and sensitive data of citizens that they are using for their activities, and additionally, that ICE agents have begun door knocking to ask residents for intel on neighbors whom they may later abduct. I have multiple concerns related to what I observed, and I fear that if left unreported that City Council will not truly understand the full reach of the situation we are experiencing here in Roseville. I urge City Council to please reach out to me. This is the 1st confirmed of 2 ICE spottings on my street that I have observed in the last 10 days, and I fear for my neighbors who we are trying desperately to protect. I am concerned that not only are the targets of ICE activities in danger, but also that ICE is collecting information from folks who may not be aware of what is going on, or are being deceived by ICE agents who are collecting information under deceptive terms.



I attended the City Council meeting on January 12. I was alternately moved and outraged at that meeting, as I have been over the past month, as I hear more and more about the bravery and community spirit of my Roseville neighbors as juxtaposed over the absolute outrageous actions of federal thugs in our community.

I was disappointed in the offer of the Council to reconvene on January 23 after analyzing the demands made by the citizens of Roseville. This is a time for immediate action. Two weeks is

equivalent to a year at the pace that things are ramping up. I urge the Council to take a page of the books of the mayors of St. Paul and Minneapolis who have already implemented measures, such as putting up signs on city property forbidding ICE staging.

I further urge the Council to IMMEDIATELY implement the suggestions of Council Member Julie Strahan:

1. No use of any Roseville resources for support of ICE, to include transport, cameras, city data, funds, real time data requests, or information about immigration status. No city staff, including Roseville Police, are allowed to participate in civil immigration enforcement.
2. All interactions between city staff and DHS/ICE must be documented, publicly disclosed, and are subject to City Council oversight.
3. City Council directs the City Manager to train city employees, utilizing written protocols, on how to respond to ICE, including when they are to refer a situation to legal counsel.
4. On city website, publish guidelines for residents on what orders they must obey and what their legal rights are, and how they may utilize RPD to safeguard their freedoms when infringed upon.
5. City will prohibit agents from any agency from conducting activities in the city of Roseville while masked or without providing identifying information.
6. Right of citizens to peacefully protest will be preserved, without interference by Roseville staff or police.
7. Signage on Roseville city property, including parks, the city campus, or city owned buildings, to bar ICE from staging or engaging in detention activities.
8. Providing signage at minimal cost to interested private businesses within Roseville to ban ICE on their private properties.
9. Charge and prosecute any individuals, ICE or otherwise, who break windows, break into vehicles, assault civilians, pull fire alarms, or cause other destruction of property or to persons, to the full extent of the law.

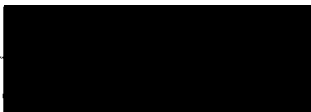

Attention City Leaders,

In addition to my previous email regarding request for action under MN State Statute 12.29, related to the public safety emergency of illegal immigration enforcement by federal agents, I wanted to provide some additional insight from

another related perspective, that might help you understand the urgency of the current situation and the potential consequences of inaction.

I am sharing some perspective from my experience working for a major retail corporation as Manager of Product Safety and Recall. This work involved: gathering customers' testimony and complaints of reports of harm caused by unsafe and defective products; analyzing the aggregate of the evidence; analyzing risk; and formulating appropriate corrective actions. This was a significant responsibility balancing protecting the retailer's customers, protecting the company's financial results, and preventing reputational harm. When the harm is obvious, the product is recalled, removed from sale, and customers asked to return the product.

ICE is defective law enforcement. It is physically, mentally, emotionally, financially, and reputationally harming people in Roseville, and the entire city as a whole.

ICE needs to be RECALLED. ICE needs to be RETURNED, out of Roseville.

When a defective product injures or kills someone, the retailer is subject to lawsuits and financial damages, as well as reputational damage that can endure for years.

Following this analogy, this is where we, Roseville, are. If you won't consider the pleas from dozens of your constituents (your "customers" in this analogy) who gave public comment in the City Council Meeting Monday 1/12, backed up by the hundreds of people who packed the entire building, backed up by countless folks who have been calling and emailing you, then will you consider if you are willing to risk the potential millions of dollars lost to future Roseville city budgets from a potential civil lawsuit from one or more Roseville victims?

Immigration Matters

413.1 PURPOSE AND SCOPE

The purpose of this policy is to provide guidelines to members of the Roseville Police Department when investigating crimes where a suspect is in violation of federal immigration laws or when interacting with federal immigration officials.

413.2 POLICY

It is the policy of the Roseville Police Department that all members make personal and professional commitments to equal enforcement of the law and equal service to the public. Confidence in this commitment will increase the effectiveness of this department in protecting and serving the entire community and recognizing the dignity of all persons, regardless of their national origin or immigration status.

The Roseville Police Department does not investigate federal immigration violations. The Roseville Police Department defers immigration enforcement responsibilities to federal immigration officers authorized to enforce both civil and criminal immigration violations.

It is the policy of the Roseville Police Department that all persons are equally entitled to protection and that all persons should be able to access police services without regard to their immigration status.

413.3 VICTIMS AND WITNESSES

The Roseville Police Department is a victim-centered organization. Individuals, regardless of their immigration status, must feel secure in contacting members of law enforcement. While it may be necessary to determine the identity of a victim or witness, members shall treat all individuals equally and shall not inquire into the immigration or citizenship status of an individual, except where the inquiry relates to a legitimate law enforcement purpose that is unrelated to the enforcement of federal immigration law.

If immigration status is uncovered inadvertently and is not relevant or an element of a crime such as human trafficking, smuggling, or a situation where the victim was targeted, threatened or harassed because of their perceived immigration status, members are not required to include the person's immigration status in reports or similar documentation.

413.4 DETENTIONS

An officer should not question, or take any law enforcement action for the purpose of enforcing a civil violation of federal immigration laws or a related civil warrant or any federal criminal immigration law that penalizes a person's presence in, entry, or reentry to, or employment in, the United States, when not accompanied by other criminal conduct. Roseville Police Officers may not undertake any law enforcement action for the sole purpose of detecting the presence of undocumented persons, or to verify immigration status, including but not limited to questioning any person or persons about their immigration status.

Immigration Matters

413.5 ARREST NOTIFICATION TO IMMIGRATION AND CUSTOMS ENFORCEMENT

Members shall not initiate actions to determine, verify, or detect a person's immigration status, unless immigration status is an element or relevant to a crime, or otherwise in conjunction with a criminal investigation of an individual who may also be in violation of federal immigration law. An officer should not notify federal immigration officials when booking arrestees at a county jail facility. Any required notification will be handled according to jail operation procedures.

413.6 FEDERAL REQUESTS FOR ASSISTANCE

Members shall not participate in immigration enforcement. As such, employees shall not inquire about a person's immigration status unless it is directly related to a criminal investigation.

Members of the department are authorized to assist in instances of federal immigration enforcement to the extent that participation is related to scene safety, the safety of members of the general public who may be present and the safety of federal immigration employees as they perform their duties.

Federal law (18 USC § 1501) prohibits members of the department from obstructing or interfering with the work of federal officers as they perform their duties. Members of the department will cooperate with ICE as specifically mandated by federal and state laws.¹

If a situation arises where federal agents, including immigration officers, are being assaulted, or there is a clear threat to life, injury, or destruction of property, members are expected to take appropriate action to maintain public safety and restore and maintain order. This response is not an endorsement of immigration enforcement, but a duty to uphold peace and protect all people from harm.

Members of the department are authorized to cooperate with a task force involving federal agents as long as the focus of the task force is not immigration enforcement.

Requests by federal immigration officials for assistance from this department should be directed to a supervisor. When possible and feasible, a supervisor should respond to calls involving immigration enforcement.

413.7 INFORMATION SHARING

No member of this department will prohibit, or in any way restrict, any other member from doing any of the following regarding the citizenship or immigration status, lawful or unlawful, of any individual (8 USC § 1373):

- (a) Sending information to, or requesting or receiving such information from federal immigration officials
- (b) Maintaining such information in department records
- (c) Exchanging such information with any other federal, state, or local government entity

Immigration Matters

413.8 U VISA AND T VISA NONIMMIGRANT STATUS

Under certain circumstances, federal law allows temporary immigration benefits, known as a U visa, to victims and witnesses of certain qualifying crimes (8 USC § 1101(a)(15)(U)).

Similar immigration protection, known as a T visa, is available for certain qualifying victims of human trafficking (8 USC § 1101(a)(15)(T)).

Any request for assistance in applying for U visa or T visa status should be forwarded in a timely manner to the Chief of Police.

Hope you are all doing well, this is a really stressful time.

I have been a Roseville resident since I was born (30 years). My husband and I purchased my parents' home in 2020.

I am a Municipal Attorney at Eckberg Lammers. I was at the League of Minnesota Cities as Christina Van Nevel in the research department from 2019 (as a law clerk the staff attorney) to 2022 so you may have seen me at LMC events. We (Roseville) have an awesome attorney in Rachel Tierney, I

followed her work in St. Paul and was excited when she stepped in as Roseville's attorney. The hard part about actually being the City Attorney is that it isn't our role to advocate for certain actions. Because I am not your City Attorney, I have the opportunity to advocate for some items I would like to see that I prepped for if/when clients asked me for their options:

1. Remove access for federal agencies in the ALPR/Flock systems (if they have access).
2. Direct staff not to grant access to federal agencies in ALPR/Flock systems.
3. Direct staff to record or take pictures of ICE activities on city owned property if they feel safe and have a plan for storing that MGDPA data.
4. Direct staff of your risk tolerance for legal ambiguities related to taking actions against ICE. (As an example, please do not state this example at the meeting because it will increase risk, BUT if you get a data request from ICE for public data, statute states cities need to respond within a "reasonable amount of time" to respond. There is some ambiguity around this and as a resident I would rather have my tax dollars go toward court costs associated with not giving ICE the data for as long as possible up until a court orders it. (Really I don't think they would challenge it but who if they did, lets take on that risk).
5. Direct staff not to permit ICE to use bathrooms not available to the public. (ICE has stopped by public safety buildings where there are not public restrooms and asked to use the restroom)
6. Direct staff to deny requests from ICE to acquire city property. (ICE is making requests to cities to use their fire trucks.)
7. Direct staff to exercise the Tenth Amendment of the Constitution to the greatest extent.
8. Schedule extra special meetings. You may not need them if there is something that staff doesn't need to you to vote on. But if staff needs to to vote on some items, this will ensure there is as little delay as possible when it comes to special meeting notice requirements.

You have strong staff and strong attorney. Thank you for being on the City Council, I know it isn't an easy job! Please reach out if I can be of any help. Again, you have a great attorney I don't want to step on toes and I can't give legal advice to the city but if there is a question you have that would be helpful coming from a resident perspective, let me know!
